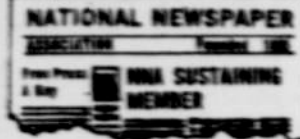

### Watergate: Sounds Of Hysteria

The Watergate drama has now reached its ultimate in hysteria with current talk that President Nixon might be impeached. That would be the final folly, with a headless country witnessing the spectacle of its accused President standing in the dock before the United States Senate for an offense committed by former subordinates already convicted and sentenced to long terms in prison.

Not that we believe there is the slightest possibility of such a denouement, because in spite of the numerous instances in which the county seemed to have lost its way in recent years, it is to be doubted that this nation is about to witness the complete liquidation of its common sense.

The sounds of hysteria that are to be heard in the land arises chiefly in the eastern part of the country, and specifically in the press of New York and Washington. At least one pulpit in New York was also used recently to spread the theme of general corruption in our government.

Our people would be well advised to withhold judgement in this matter, and not jump to the conclusion that either the President or his Administration is guilty of an entirely quixotic and criminal action. It is reasonable to believe that the man who has been Vice President and President of the United States over so many years did not act without wisdom or that he had prior knowledge of this case. His public statement with its denial of any involvement in the case is convincing and final.

### Elder Stapley To Speak At LDS Conference

Sunday, May 13, will be recognized as Youth Sunday in St. Paul's, and the entire Service of Morning Prayer will be conducted by Scott Ableman, Miriam Hopkins, Lauri Stutz, and John Tenson, representing the Youth of the Church.

On that morning, the Rev. John K. Worrall, Missionary-in-charge of the Church will preach the second in a two-part sermon series on whether or not King Henry VIII of England started the Episcopal Church.

In the first sermon Mr. Worrall covered some 41 centuries beginning with the Celtic people in Gaul, or what we now know as France, in that period of time known as the La Tene Civilization, through their and the Angles, Saxons, and Frisians partial conquests of England, the development of Christianity in the first century A.D., and then to the schism between the Celtic Christians and the Roman Christians in the latter part of the seventh century. The next sermon will cover the many and varied frictions which arose out of the continued schism between these two parties with its culmination in the separation between England and Rome in the sixteenth century, and the establishment of the Holy Catholic Church of England when Henry VII was King.
