Speaking to the Consumer

GET IT IN WRITING. If you are getting an estimate for services or repairs, don't accept a verbal quotation. Have the estimate written down and itemized as to what covers labor and what covers materials. The Oregon Consumer Services Division reports that more complaints come in about estimates than any other consumer problem. Without a written estimate, recourse is very difficult.

SAFETY FOR THE BABY. Buying a baby crib? Look for a model that states on the label it meets new federal safety regulations. These cribs have slats spaced to prevent a child from getting caught between the slats. The side rail height

guards against a baby falling or rolling out of the crib, even when the rail is in a lowered position. The new regulations also standardize the size of the crib. This will lead to standardized mattress sizes and the problem of improperly fitting mattresses, eliminating the danger of a baby getting trapped between a mattress and the crib frame.

REVERSING THE TREND. What items are dropping in price while the other costs continue to climb? Appliances, that's what! As a group, washing machines, clothes dryers, vacuum cleaners, refrigerators and freezers, ranges, radio and television sets, air conditioners and garbage disposals show no

price increase over the past year on the Consumer Price Index. During the previous year, appliances rose less than one per cent. Some have actually dropped in price because of new manufacturing techniques and technology. In addition, some appliances such as refrigerator-freezers and air conditioners are being made to use less electricity, which further lowers consumer costs.

HELP FROM THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY. Your local District Attorney is charged under Oregon's Consumer Protection Act to handle misleading and deceptive trade practices. Some consumers are reluctant to report an unfair business practice, however, because they think they might be charged a legal fee or their names will

be used publicly. This is no problem. The District Attorney is a public official who accepts no fees, and you will not become publicly involved unless you sign a formal complaint.

KNOW THE ROOF REPAIRER. This is the season when homeowners who need repairs to their roofs due to winter damage may get caught by roof repair "specialists" who collect--then disappear. The Portland Better Business Bureau already reports one such "Specialist" who traveled across the state knocking on doors and presenting his business card. Although he told the homeowners his work was "guaranteed" and his firm "bonded," he left a trail of complaints. Work that was paid for in advance was never done. Or, when some repairs were

done, the homeowners now find that their roofs leak as badly if not worse than before. Before paying any money for home repairs, always check out the reputation of the business firm you will be dealing with. Call the Better Business Bureau, Chamber of Commerce, law enforcement officials, or building contractors' association for information on the firm.
