Favorite Foods

I had an interesting experience while in Oregon and California recently. I'm always discussing recipes, as you might guess. A friend in Portland said she had been using a recipe, Danish Puff, and wanted me to try it.

From Portland I went to Yieka, California where my family lives. Guess what we had for Easter Breakfast! Danish Puffs! This time the recipe came from Pleasanton, California. My daughter-in-law's sister made it and served it.

DANISH PUFF

1/2 cup butter
1 cup flour
2 tsp. water
1/2 cup butter
1 cup water
1 tsp. almond extract
1 cup flour
3 eggs

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Cut 1/2 cup butter into 1 cup flour. Sprinkle 2 tsp. water over mixture; mix until blended. Round into ball and divide in half. On an ungreased baking sheet, pat each half into a strip 12"x3inches. Strips should be about 3 inches apart.

Next heat 1/2 cup butter and 1 cup water to a rolling boil in a medium saucepan. Remove from heat and quickly stir in almond extract and 1 cup flour. Stir vigorously over low heat until mixture forms a ball, about one minute. Remove from range. Beat in eggs, all at once until smooth and glossy. Divide this in half and spread each half evenly over strips. Bake about 60 minutes or until topping is crisp and brown. Cool (Topping will shrink and fall, forming the crusty top of the Puff) Frost with Confectioner's Sugar Glaze and sprinkle generously with almonds. Serves 12.

Confectioner's Sugar Icing
1 cup sifted confectioner's sugar
1 to 2 tsp. warm water, milk or cream

1/2 tsp. vanilla or lemon juice
Mix together and spread or drizzle over bread while slightly warm. Sprinkle with sliced almonds.

U.S. Savings Bonds Have Record First Quarter

First quarter sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in the State of Oregon established a 28-year record according to figures released by the U. S. Treasury Department today. Oregonians purchased \$3,853,758 worth of bonds in March, boosting the first quarter's sales to \$13,885,495. Sales continue to outstrip redemptions in Oregon, and, as a result, Oregonians' total holdings of Series E and H bonds were \$490 million at the end of the first quarter.

The U. S. Treasury Department, while acknowledging the

beneficial influence of the new 5 1/2% bonus interest rate, still feels that the true motivating factor in the vastly stimulated sales is the increased activity on the Payroll Savings Plan. This automatic, painless mode of savings has made U. S. Savings Bonds the greatest thrift program in the history of man. Currently, 23 million families, or more than one out of every three families in the United States own Savings Bonds. The average investment of \$32 per month per saver, boosted total holdings of Series E and H Savings Bonds to \$59 billion in March.

Nationally, E and H Bond sales totaled \$599 million in March-the highest total for any month since the H Bond was introduced in 1952. For the 300 consecutive months, sales exceeded redemptions at cost price. March redemptions of \$407 million were \$191 million less than sales.

Jim Leslie, County Chairman, said that Malheur County had reached 27% of the 197 goal with sales of \$93,347.
