

The Department of Veterans' Affairs granted 932 veterans' farm and home loans in April in the amount of \$17,506,147, setting a new dollar volume record for the second month in a row, H. C. Saalfeld, director, reported today. The previous record, set in

March, was 831 loans for \$16,-024,907. Last month's 932 loans was only fourth highest in number of loans.

Loans in April a year ago totaled 621 for \$11,452,000. Last month's 1,115 loan applications was second only to the previous month's record 1,154. Applications in April a year ago totaled 814.
