

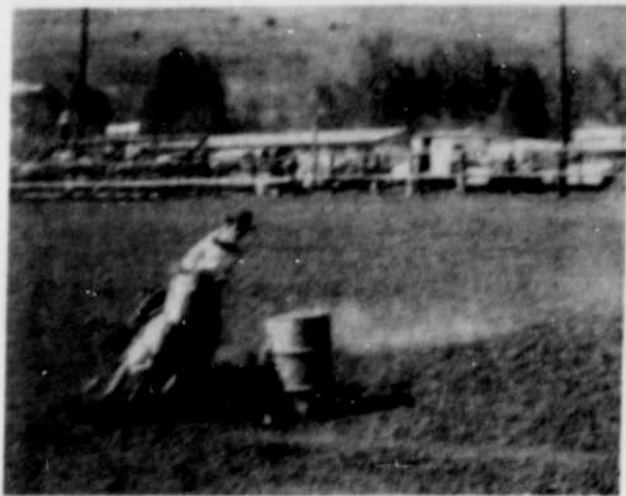


FISHING TACKLE

Participated At John Day

This past weekend the Nyssa High School Rodeo Team was in John Day for a high school rodeo.

Almost 200 students, eight of which were from Nyssa participated in the rodeo.

Those entered from Nyssa were:

Frank Rodriguez, bareback and bull riding; Carl Cleaver, bareback and bull riding; Wes Cleaver, bareback riding; Wade Johnson, bareback riding and Randy Froerer, bare back riding; Gomo Martinez, bareback riding, bull riding and calf roping as an independent.

Evelyn Bailey, barrel racing, pole bending, and goat tying; Jill Jackson, barrel racing and pole bending.

Frank Rodriguez scored a 57 in bull riding and Evelyn Bailey ran her barrels in 19.9 seconds Saturday.

Also at the rodeo as assistance to the advisors were Eileen Joyce and Renee Lattin. Advisors and chaperons were Mr. and Mrs. Burnell Stelling, Fred Child, and Joe Bailey.

The Nyssa Team wishes to invite everyone to the next high school rodeo at the Nyssa arena May 26 and 27. Both performances will start at 1 p.m. The Queens contest will be Saturday morning for the Nyssa Nite Rodeo prior to the high school rodeo and will be announced during the Saturday show.

ANTELOPE PERMIT DRAWING HELD

Successful antelope tag applicants will have three months instead of one to plan their hunt this year as a result of a drawing held today at the Game Commission Portland headquarters.

Tag quotas for each unit were filled by using the ending digit on the application card in the sequence 7, 8, 4, 6, 0, 3, 5, 2, 9, 1, with the first two of three numbers filling quotas for all units. A total of 1,681 individuals, including 232 who submitted five or more unsuccessful notices from past years to gain priority status, will be notified of their success within the next ten days. They will have until May 29 to submit the \$5 fee. Tags will be sent to the successful applicants in June. Unsuccessful applicants will be returned by the end of May.

All totaled, 17,728 prospective hunters, nearly double the 9,452 total in 1972, submitted valid applications. A change in procedure requiring no money with the application plus considerable publicity on the early drawing date are believed responsible for the increase. Formerly, antelope seasons were set with other big game in late May and tags were drawn in late July. This left only a few weeks for validation and distribution of tags before the mid-August season. Eliminating an application fee prior to the drawing saves the Commission time and expense of issuing refund checks to unsuccessful applicants.

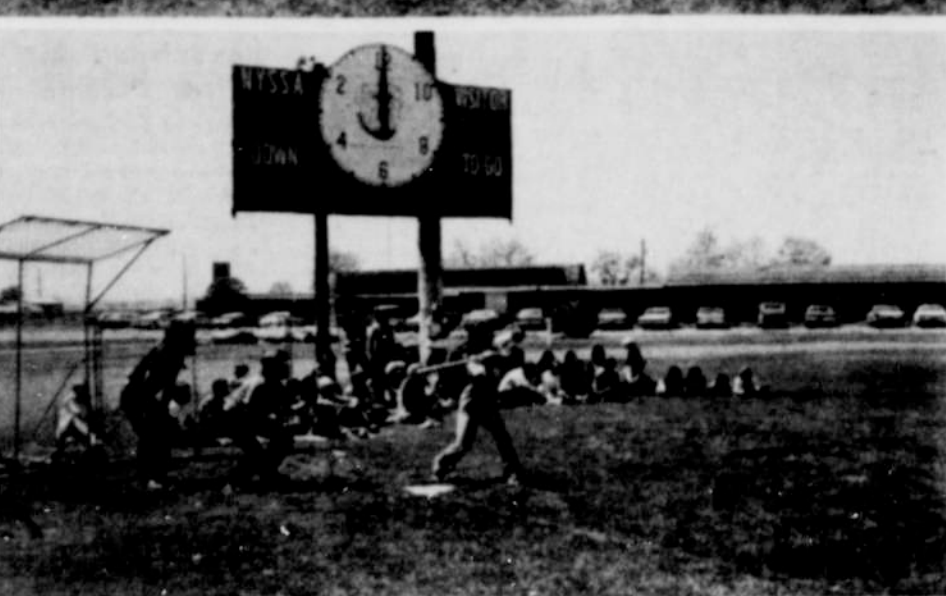

Implement Head Says Farm Prices Lowest In History

Despite the current emotional reaction to food prices, Americans are spending a significantly smaller share of their income for food than they did 20 years ago, Chairman William A. Hewitt of Deere & Company told Company stockholders today.

Hewitt, whose firm sells more farm equipment each year than any other company in the world, said Americans are spending only 15.7 percent of their after-tax income on food today compared with 23 percent in 1952.

"In those 20 years, after-tax incomes have risen 150 percent. Spending for food went up 70 percent. During the same 20 years, prices of all consumer goods went up 58 percent. Housing prices climbed 64 percent. Medical care prices increased 123 percent. Prices of food away from home -- 'eating out' -- increased 90 percent. Prices of food prepared at home rose only 38 percent," he said.

"The farmer is one of the most productive workers in America. His output per man hour has tripled in 20 years. No other segment of our economy is close to matching that record.

"Strangely when we pass out rewards for outstanding performance and production, the farmer has not gotten his full share. Income from farming over the past 20 years has gone up 36 percent. Personal income from farming over the past 20 years has gone up 36 percent. Personal income of all Americans has risen 250 percent. The average income of farm people is 17 percent less than that of city and townspeople.

"In the past 20 years average farm prices have increased only 12 percent. The level of prices farmers pay has risen 51 percent, and farmer's total production costs have more than doubled."

Noting that in 20 years Americans have increased their beef consumption from 62 pounds per person to 116 pounds per person, Hewitt said food prices have gone up because the demand for food has gone up faster than food production can be increased in a short period.

"Last year food production increased, and it will continue to increase this year. A supply of food sufficient to fill the demand for it will bring prices down -- not price ceilings and price-rollback that operate to reduce supplies," he said.

Hewitt said an instant reduction in food prices through price controls which some people seek would be counter-productive.
