10 YEARS AGO

A highly destructive wreck occurred on the main track of the Union Pacific Railroad Company at Apple Valley siding three miles south of Nyssa, at 8:40 Wednesday morning.

Estimates of damage run as high as \$250,000. Thirty-one freight cars were totally demolished, 62,000 bushels of wheat were dumped and more than one mile of track destroyed or damaged.

SPEAKING TO THE CONSUMER

REVIEW INSURANCE NOW.

If you have received a recent tax appraisal on your house, use this information to review your insurance protection. Your tax statement will list the house and land separately so you can compare the dollars assigned to the house with the amount of insurance you are carrying. If you find a wide difference, your home may be underinsured. Inflation has zoomed replacement costs and families often find their insurance has not been kept up to date with current replacement costs.

VETERANS' BENEFITS LISTED.

Families that include a veteran who was in the military service prior to 1955 may have overlooked or be unaware of help available to them. A new, easy-to-understand bulletin summarizing benefits is being widely distributed. It outlines pension and loan plans and gives detailed instructions for applying for insurance, rehabilitation, medical and dental treatment, and aid available for dependents.

Copies of this bulletin are in all county Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service and Farmer's Home Administration offices. They are also available free from Veteran's Administration, 426 SW Stark St., Portland 97204.

"MERCHANDISE ONLY" Refunds.

Consumers report that mail-order companies frequently send refund certificates that can be used only for merchandise from that company. This is most likely to happen when a particular item is out of stock.

If you have no use for the "merchandise only" refund and want your payment in cash, be sure to write the company and tell them so. If you do not receive the check in a reasonable amount of time, contact Oregon Consumer Service Division, Box 444, Salem, OR 97310 for help with your problem.

CONSUMER SPOKESMAN.

On January 10 price controls were lifted as the government moved to regulate the inflation spiral through wage and profit controls. While there is no freeze on individual non-food prices, as of May 2 major companies were directed not to increase their overall pricing structure more than 1.5 per cent above the January 10 base price without a "cost-justification" hearing before the Cost of Living Council.

So what can the consumer do if he sees a sudden major price increase on a product he's shopping for? He can contact Mary K. Ryan, consumer representative to the President's Cost of Living Council. She welcomes price information and comments. The address is 2000 M Street NW, Washington, D.C. 20508.

A VACATION HOME SITE?

Take a hard look--and ask all the big questions--if you're in the market for a vacation home site. Questions you should ask range from guarantees on "promised" development of roadways, sanitary systems, and recreational facilities to the financial stability of the developer. Consider fire safety and whether roads and cul-de-sacs are wide enough to permit easy access by fire fighting equipment. These are just starter questions. Look at the whole package before you make your decision to buy.

TEENAGE JOB-SEEKERS.

Teenagers seeking either part-time or full-time jobs this summer should apply immediately for a social security card. Most jobs require that a young person present a social security card as a condition of employment. Some employers may be willing to wait until the job-seeker applies for his card but it will speed up both hiring procedure and paycheck if the social security number is immediately available. Then social security benefit credits can be properly recorded in the teenager's name.

Check the telephone book for the location of your Social Security Office. If you have no office in your town, check with the U.S. Post Office.

SAFER MATTRESSES.

Flammability standards effective this June will help prevent bedding fires. Mattresses manufactured after this must resist bursting into flame when tested with lighted cigarettes and they also must char no more than a specified amount. Each mattress style and fabric made by a manufacturer will be tested separately and production runs will be retested periodically. The mattresses also must resist fires started in the bed sheets and not cause further combustion.

Protecting people from injury and death from bedding

fires has been a major concern of the national Consumer Product Safety Commission. This testing procedure--and the flammability standards--were developed after studies showed that 80 per cent of all bedding fires were caused by cigarettes. Even if you're not a smoker, the standards offer increased protection.

If you're in the market for a new mattress, look for the label that states it meets the new flammability standards.

AIRLINE COMPLAINT "HOT LINE"

You can now register complaints about airline service by using the Civil Aeronautics Board's "hot line". Call 202-382-7735 at any time. A CAB staff member will talk with you about your complaint during usual office hours. At nights and during weekends, you may leave a message for a CAB representative to return your call later during CAB office hours.

To avoid paying long distance telephone charges, call collect. The Federal Government cannot accept collect calls. However, a CAB Staff member can take your name, telephone number and the name of airline involved in your complaint from the operator and return your call. At nights and during weekends, you have to pay the telephone charge for the time it takes you to leave a message with a recording machine.

UNDERSTAND YOUR PENSION PLAN.

Do you really know what is in the pension plan offered by the company you work for? Do you know where the money is being invested and who is handling these funds?

Under the Pension Plan Disclosure Act that went into effect March 18, your company should be providing you with an easily understood description of plan benefits and rules. In addition, you must be notified that plan descriptions and annual reports are available for examination and, upon written request, you can have a copy of all reports. The Act applies to over 33,000 private pension plans.

If you have a non-governmental pension plan, talk to your employer or your personnel officer if you have questions, or have not received a "simple language" description of your plan.

FLAMMABLE SLEEPWEAR OBSOLETE.

During May and June you can expect to see clearance sales on children's sleepwear (up to size 6x). Stores will be clearing out old stock that does not meet the federal flame retardant fabric regulations.

After July 1, all children's sleepwear up to size 6x offered for sale must meet the requirements or be labeled "Flammable. Should not be worn near source of fire."

SNOW TIRE CARE.

It's time to store your snow tires. To keep them in the best possible condition, says the Tire Industry Safety Council, put the tires in a cool dry place--not in a damp basement or where the hot summer sun raises temperatures above 50 degrees. Mark the studded tires with "right" and "left" so that you can properly replace them on the same wheels next winter. If possible, store tires away
