OREGON MOTORISTS BEWARE MEMORIAL TRAFFIC CONDITIONS

Memorial Day is a time when Americans offer respectful honor to their war dead, but it is also a time when many Americans are injured or killed on the nation's highways.

The problem is accentuated in Oregon where the three-day holiday weekend represents the year's first nice-weather break from weekly routine and the chance to take long jaunts, says the Insurance Information Institute.

Increased traffic, weekend weariness, distracting sights and carefree driving will all help to create hazardous conditions for Oregon motorists. Many will be involved in accidents unless certain precautions are observed.

Last year, 7 persons were killed in Memorial Day crack-ups on the state's roadways. Another 291 were injured.

According to the Institute, during the three-day period highway deaths, on an average, will run about 15 to 18 per cent above comparable non-holiday periods. Moreover, the weekend represents one of the six national holidays during which between 6 and 8 per cent of all traffic fatalities occur.

The Institute advises that you can reduce the chances of becoming a Memorial Day traffic statistic by following a few rules:

- * Don't attempt to drive too far in three days. For night trips arrange for someone else to help drive--death rates are highest at night.
* Break the trip into frequent stops and open windows for fresh air.
* Make effective use of your eyes. Keep them moving to spot situations at the earliest moments and expect the unexpected.
* Don't drive competitively and give a little. Anti-social factors make congested highways a hostile environment.
* Exercise a proper regard for all traffic laws, especially those relating to speeding and drinking and driving.

MALHEUR MEMORIAL HOSPITAL A Report To The People

This brings us up to March of 1966 when the services of Mr. Louis Barr were once again contracted to raise \$125,000 to clear up mortgage and other expenses of the hospital. Named to head the campaign was Jed Lewis, member of the Amalgamated Sugar Company and president of the Malheur Memorial Hospital Association, named co-chairman of the campaign were Harold Hennings, Warren Farmer and Bob Johnson.

In April, Warren Farmer was named Chairman of the Advance Gifts Committee.

A rest home of nine beds was instituted in May of 1956. The occupants were mainly elderly individuals who are not serious hospital cases but require long-time medical attention. There they have a happy home and immediate advantage of the best of medical facilities and nutritious food. Filled to capacity at the present time, there are several applications on file for individuals wishing admittance. Extra furnishings for the wing were obtained by donations or purchases under the sponsorship of the hospital auxiliary members. John O'toole stated, "I don't know what we would do without the ladies auxiliary."

An article in the Gate City Journal on January 15, 1959 states "A proposal to turn all Malheur Memorial hospital properties over to a hospital tax district, encompassing the city of Nyssa and a proposed area based on the boundaries of the Nyssa Rural Road Assessment district No. 2, with a total assessed property value of \$7,422,000 and on which a two-mill annual levy is proposed,

will be presented to members of Malheur Memorial Hospital Association.

In reviewing the scrap book of the ladies auxiliary we find that the conductive floor in surgery was added in 1960 when a check was presented to Mr. John Stam by the auxiliary in the amount of \$600.00. It was also interesting to note that in those days it was still possible to serve home canned items in the hospital and how busy the ladies were in preparing food for the hospital.

The auxiliary of the hospital has always helped wherever maintenance and service need a boost. During the polio years auxiliary volunteers contributed many hours to relieve the burden on the overworked staff. Many valuable pieces of equipment have been purchased through efforts of the auxiliary.

In December 1967, word was received that Malheur Memorial Hospital will be able to proceed with construction of a nursing home wing, following the release of \$129,000 Hill-Burton funds that were frozen in President Johnson's economy move in late October. The Extended Care Facility was built in 1968 and opened to accept patients in January of 1969. Mr. and Mrs. Gerrit Stam of Nyssa are responsible for the beautiful patio which according to architect's estimate cost \$2,723.00. It is known as the Stam Memorial Courtyard.
