Favorite Foods

I haven't said much about Fondue but I really enjoy serving them. I like the informality and sociability which they create. Served with a tossed salad, french bread and fresh fried you have a perfect meal with very little "fuss and bother."

While in California last month my daughter-in-law gave me a recipe she uses. I agree with her, it's very good.

CLAM FONDUE

3 jars old English cheese
6 finely chopped green onions
1/2 green pepper, finely chopped
1 tsp. worcestershire sauce
3 shakes tobasco sauce
1 can minced clam (drain and save juice)
Combine all ingredients and melt in fondue pot, stirring occasionally. Cut french bread into chunks and use as dip for fondue.

TOMATO-ZUCCHINI CASSEROLE

3 zucchini squash, sliced into rings on a diagonal
1 large onion, sliced
3 large tomatoes, sliced
1 tsp. salt
2 teaspoons sweet basil
1/4 cup grated parmesan cheese butter or margarine
Butter the bottom of a 9"x9"x2" pan. Line dish with a layer of sliced zucchini, then onions and sliced tomatoes. Top layer with 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. basil, 2 tsp. parmesan cheese. Dot with butter. Repeat layers with zucchini, onion and tomatoes. Top with remaining salt, basil and cheese. Dot with butter Bake uncovered in a 375 degree oven for 45 minutes. Serves 6 to 8.



If you like preparing meals easily you'll want to make this tomato-zucchini casserole, especially if you like Italian foods. Besides that, this casserole is low in calories and loaded with vitamins and minerals. (Go easy on the butter)

Butterflies Migrate

The swarms of butterflies passing through parts of Malheur County have been identified as painted ladies or thistle butterflies according to Malheur County Extension Agent Leeds Bailey.

These butterflies are the most abundant of western species. Records indicate that great migratory flights of the insects often occur, especially in southern California.

The larvae or worm form of the butterfly feeds on such plants as thistle and related weeds. Instances in Malheur County have been noted where the larvae completely defoliated Canada thistle. However, parasites of the larvae keep numbers down to the point they can't be depended on to eradicate the weed pest. Normally the painted ladies don't feed on crops grown in the Malheur County area. However, records indicate that when the insects are abundant they will attack beans, sunflowers and prunes.
