OSU Crew Led By Nyssa Youth

Gary Sadamori, Nyssa junior at Oregon State University and son of Mr. and Mrs. George Sadamori, is coxswain for the OSU lightweight crew.



The crew, under Sadamori's direction, has just completed a successful year, placing second in the Western Sprints Regatta held at Los Gatos, Calif.

Twenty-two schools from California to Canada were represented, and OSU lost to last year's winners, UCLA, by eight-hundredths of a second. During this regatta, the lightweight soundly beat the University of Washington team twice in different heats. This UW crew was the northwestern champs from last year.

Earlier in the season, the OSU lightweight team placed first in the 10th annual Corvallis Regatta, shutting out a fast UW team in the finals. In addition to being a member of the crew team, Gary is the President of Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity. He was elected during the winter term and will serve until the next winter term.

HENIGSON EARNS WHITMAN DEGREE

Stuart Henigson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hal Henigson, Nyssa, received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics from Whitman College Sunday, May 27, during the college's 1973 Commencement. Stuart graduated with honors in major study, summa cum laude.

Henigson also received the Wall Street Journal Award for scholarship in Economics. He has been accepted by Yale University for post graduate studies.

The Commencement formally ended Whitman's 114th year since the college received its charter in 1859. A total of 205 students were awarded degrees.

Dr. Bernard Berelson, president of The Population Council, New York City, a 1934 Whitman graduate, gave the annual Commencement address.

River was reported doubtful, since the river is at its lowest stage in many years.

In the Columbia Basin wheat producing counties the entire grain crop is threatened by the dry winter. Unless June brings rains of adequate amounts the wheat yield is expected to be the lowest in several years and of lower quality than usual. Spring plantings to replace wheat lost in the winter freeze have not done well because of the lack of moisture and reports were that many acres probably will not be harvested.

Livestock men are continuing to have difficulty with coyotes. Particularly mentioned was the problem of sheep losses to them.

A bright spot for sheepmen, however, was the brief dramatic rise in wool prices though they have now dropped considerably. Credited with this rise was the purchase of wool by both Japan and Russia. Reports are that there is some indication these markets may open up again.

Reports on Oregon's dairy industry, while showing more milk sold for higher prices, pointed out that dairymen have had the greatest increase in production costs in 20 years and that optimism over alfalfa supplies for the great increase in prices for hay and commercial feeds.

Oregon Lung Association will be the new name of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association.

The new name will become effective June 1, 1973, at the Association's 58th annual meeting in Portland. The adoption of the new name is in conjunction with the change by the National Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association to the American Lung Association.

In announcing the change, Association President Al Starns, Burns, explained that "the name 'Oregon Lung Association' better identifies the purpose of the voluntary health association, which is to prevent and control lung diseases.

Oregon Dairymen Set Dairy Month Schedule

June is dairy month, remind Oregon dairymen.

To celebrate the traditional month-long event, the Oregon Dairy Products Commission has scheduled a two-stage multimedia promotional effort throughout the state, reports Ray Kozak, ODPIC executive secretary.

Highlighting the program will be Oregon Dairy Princess Janice Waibel of Hillsboro, who will tour the state from border to border helping to promote peak summertime milk consumption.

Actually, Kozak explained, the dairy commission will conduct two promotional thrusts during the month involving maximum use of several advertising mediums.

The new "Milk Has Something for Every Body" slogan will form the nucleus of the overall strategy for the campaign. During the month of June and through mid-July, the dairy commission will sponsor a homemade ice cream promotion throughout the state with full page, four-color and black and white newspaper advertising featuring the line, "Do your friends a flavor." Homemade ice cream recipes will appear in the advertising copy. The newspaper campaign will be supported by outdoor and radio schedules.

Another promotion will offer the free use of a deluxe motor-home for two months and 500

Wool Pool Ships 93 Tons

Approximately 93 tons of wool is being loaded into boxcars and shipped out of the J.C. Watson Company warehouse in Parma. A total of 360 lots - 186,900 pounds - makes up the shipment of Pocatello.

It's the clip of the Parma Wool Pool.

The pool is a cooperative arrangement whereby both small and large flock owners in Southwestern Idaho and Eastern Oregon work together for mutual advantage in marketing and shipping their wool.

Although the present market is hovering near 50-cents-a-pound, the clip was sold in March for \$1.1596 a pound, well above the 47 cents-plus of 1972 and the low 1971 figure of 29 cents-plus.

The 1971 price had been the lowest since 1937. Carson Tool Co., Rochelle, Ill., is buyer of this year's clip. Jim Conder, representative of the company, said they operate a subsidiary at Pocatello, where initial handling and grading is carried out prior to shipping to Illinois.

OSU Graduation Includes Several From County

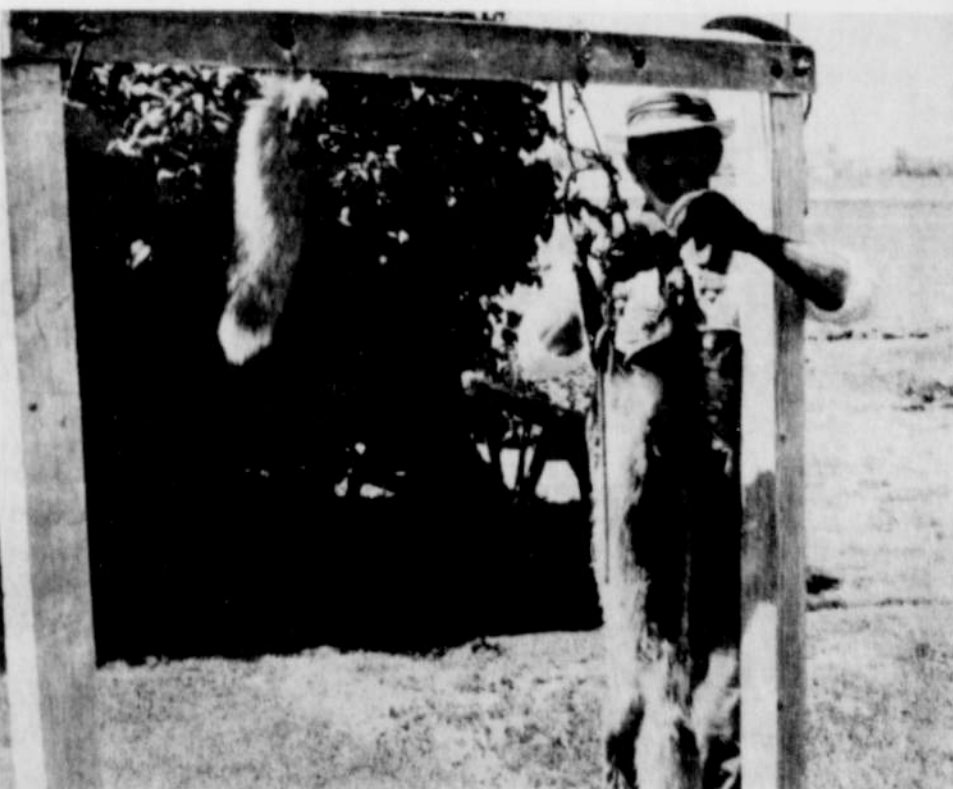
