Reverend Bob's Column

During the Memorial Day 1864 expresses what I would like to say better than I can say it, "I have been shown in the files of the War Department of those who had paid the supreme sacrifice in the time of war. Abraham Lincoln's letter to Mrs. Bixby on November 21, battle. I feel how weak and

fruitless must be any words of mine which should attempt to beguile you from the grief of a loss so overwhelming. But I cannot refrain from tendering to you the consolation that may be found in the thanks of the Republic they died to save. I pray that our heavenly Father may assuage the anguish of your bereavement, and leave you only the cherished memory of the loved and lost, and the solemn pride that must be yours to have laid so costly a sacrifice upon the altar of freedom."

Later on he wrote concerning the mothers of our war heroes, "I am not accustomed to the language of eulogy; I have never studied the art of paying compliments to women; but I must say, that if all that has been said by orators and poets since the creation of the world in praise of women were applied to the women of America, it would not do them justice for their conduct during this war. I will close by saying, God bless the women of America." I cannot refrain from adding to this column on the mothers of our servicemen something about my own mother. I was but a small child when I watched my mother see off to the Second World War the first of five sons. As each one left my mother would add their name to a special prayer list. Many was the night that I heard her in her bedroom lifting their names one by one to God in prayer. Her prayers reached to The Throne of God for each one endured the battle without so much as a wound and all returned home again in good health. I am certain that it was Mother's Prayers that kept them during the battles that they went through.

With President Lincoln, too, lift my voice in thanksgiving for the mothers of our servicemen. God bless the women of America and God bless the mothers, the wives and sweethearts of those who have served in the wars in which our young men have fought.
