Main feature of the float will be animated life-size floral figures of Anna and the King dancing in the center of the ballroom.

The King's costume, a replica of the one worn by Yul Brynner in the role, will be made of vermilion gladioli petals, yellow daffodil and carnation petals.

Anna's gown will be made of orchid-colored gladioli petals and vanda orchids.

The large, delicate float is the ballroom of the King's palace and features a series of lace-work arches in Siamese style. An overhead canopy of yellow roses encircles the float. Overall color scheme of the float is yellow, white and black and uses thousands of Golden Wave and Town Crier roses. The float is decorated without the use of dye or paint. All of the flowers appear in their natural colors.

STATE DEPARTMENT TO REPAIR DAMAGE

An agreement with the State Forestry Department for the repair of Tussock Moth damaged areas involving approximately 160 acres in Hilgard-Perry Scenic Strip in Union County was approved today by the State Highway Commission.

The agreement is the result of consultations with State Forestry Department field and administrative personnel and provides an excellent means of repairing the heavy damage done to the area by the 1972 Tussock Moth outbreak.

To reduce the hazard of fire, the area will be cleaned up and reforested.

The maximum cost to the Highway Commission for the timber cleanup and reforestation project is \$20,000.
