Game Commission Sets 1973 Big Game Seasons

Big game hunting regulations for 1973 were set following a public hearing in Portland last week. Seasons are similar to last year and little changed from Game Commission staff recommendations published several weeks ago.

The general deer season will begin October 6 throughout the state, extending through October 18 in eastern Oregon and ending on November 11 on the west side. Again this year, no antlerless permits will be issued for eastern Oregon deer in order to protect mule deer herds which are still rebounding from a winter die-off and poor fawn survival in the past five years.

A High Cascade buck hunt will

again be offered beginning on September 15 and extending through September 23. Hunters should take note that permits are required to participate in this hunt beginning this year.

Rocky Mountain elk hunters can begin their hunt on October 27 in a season that will extend through November 14. In the nine unit southeastern area, hunters may take elk of either sex from the beginning of the season through November 4, and bulls during the remainder of the season.

Roosevelt elk season will open November 17 and run through November 28. Rifle hunters will have an additional opportunity this year to draw for 100 antlerless permits to be issued for two

areas in the Birkenfeld vicinity northwest of Portland. This area has been newly opened to limited rifle hunting because of heavy agricultural damage.

Bear season will be similar to last year, opening on August 1 and extending through December 31.

Ten tags will be drawn for hunting bighorn sheep with eight to be issued for the Steens Mountain Unit and two for a new area, the Onyiah Unit. The season will open September 15 and run through September 21.

No open season will be held for mountain goat in Oregon during 1973.

Cougar will become legal game for 83 permit holders in northeast and southwest Ore-

gon during the month of December. Permits will be restricted to more specific areas than in the past in order to spread the harvest over a larger area.

Bow hunters will have a wide selection of areas to hunt, and muzzle loader enthusiasts will have special hunts at Hart Mountain Refuge and Patterson Mountain, the same as last year.

The Game Commission has authorized a change in the minimum requirement for rifles that may be used for taking deer, antelope, cougar and bear. Twenty-two caliber centerfire rifles which develop at least 900 foot-pounds of energy at 100 yards will be legal this year. Rifle .22's remain illegal as do some of the lower powered

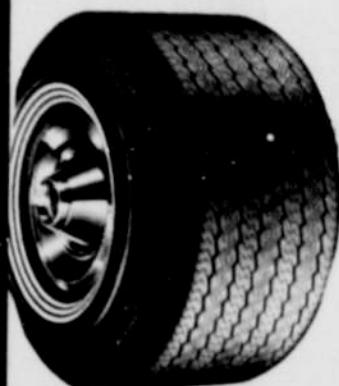
Local Boys Place In Junior Olympics
