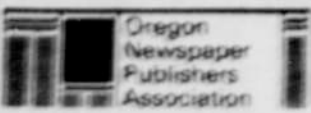

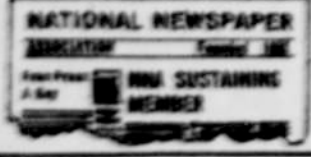
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SO PROUDLY WE HAIL!

President Woodrow Wilson's eloquent address on Flag Day, June 14, 1917 is an effective reminder to all of the significance of Old Glory:

It has no other character than that which we give it from generation to generation. The choice is ours. We celebrate the day of its birth, and from its birth until now it has witnessed a great history, has floated on high the symbol of great events, of a great plan of life worked out by a great people..."

Services for William Edward (Bill) Church, 65, Nyssa, who died Monday, June 11, 1973 at his home will be conducted at 2 p.m. Thursday (today) at the Lienkaemper chapel in Nyssa. The Rev. Robert Manley, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, will officiate and interment will be at the Nyssa cemetery.

He was born Jan. 5, 1908 in Rocky Ford, Colo. He was a veteran of World War II. He came to Nyssa in 1947 and was employed by the Amalgamated Sugar Company until he retired.

Services for Louis Pando, 72, formerly of Ontario, who died at his home in rural Parma (Apple Valley), Tuesday, June 5, 1973 were conducted June 5, Friday at the Berlioz-Lienkaemper Memorial Chapel in Ontario by the Rev. Edward McIndoo, pastor of the First Christian Church. Interment was at Evergreen Cemetery.

He was born July 3, 1901, in Kortzy, Albania. He moved to the United States to the Boston area in 1918. He followed the produce business in the Eastern United States until coming to the West Coast in 1927. He moved to Ontario in 1943 and was employed by the J. F. Simplot Company of Ontario as produce foreman.

He retired from Simplot in 1966, the same year he became a citizen of the United States. He was married to Faye Iva December 6, 1944 in Winnemucca, Nevada. He was a member of the Albanian Orthodox Church in Boston. He was active in the Moose Lodge in Emmett.

Survivors are his wife, Faye, Parma; a daughter, Mrs. Jess (Charlotte) Jackson, Murtaugh; a brother, Sotir Pando, Boston, Massachusetts; a sister in Albania; and four grandchildren.

Farmers who cannot obtain lumber with present rating, should apply to the county farm rationing committee for certificates to purchase lumber for maintenance, repair and new construction necessary to the food production program.

40 YEARS AGO

Robert "Pod" Long is busy hunting coyotes by the den at this season of the year. Because this county is credited with having more coyotes than any other in the state, Fred Sankey, assistant leader of the biological survey, has accompanied Long on a number of trips. The dens are usually found in badger holes and quite frequently more than one family makes use of the same hole. In some dens as many as 15 pups are found and killed.

The biological survey estimated that the average coyote will destroy \$25 worth of stock. Es-

50 YEARS AGO

Those restless and wild spirits who in the old days turned to cattle rustling in the range districts to provide money and excitement have turned to less hazardous and more remunerative game of "moon-shining." Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, asserts reliable stock owners of the interior sections have reported to him.

"Some of the reliable stock owners of the interior report that cattle stealing has become an obsolete interior occupation. This is due to the alleged fact that the majority of the range offenders have gone into the manufacturing of moonshine and that they previously engaged in smuggling in of coyote pelts in order to collect bounty. It is stated that these present and past lines of endeavor offer no such hazards as the cattle rustling previously carried."

Malheur County still has an occasional rustling case to contend with.

60 YEARS AGO

Reuben McCree, promoter and all-around prominent citizen of Adrian, was in the city Saturday. Mr. McCree had intended to give a big excursion and picnic on June 12 as a sort of grand opening of the new town, but owing to the fact that regular train service on the Nyssa-Homedale road will not be started until the 15th, the excursion had to be called off, but later the picnic and excellent program will be given and good, old-fashioned time will be had. 1.5 Million Homes To Be Cooled in '73

The air conditioning industry will supply about 1.5 million families with new whole-house cooling systems this year. The Air Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute estimates, bringing the total number of centrally cooled U. S. homes to 10 million. Forty-two per cent of the new homes being built this year are expected to have central air conditioning.

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
