New Nigerian Pipeline Ups Production Capacity

Completion of a 65-mile pipeline in Nigeria from Ubie to a new terminal at the mouth of the Brass River was announced by W. F. Martin, president of Phillips Petroeum Company, Bartlesville,

Crude oil movement was started through the 24-inch diameter pipeline on April 5 with initial throughput of 89,000 barrels of oil per day.
