

The general farm rate will apparently decline from the present \$16.54 per \$100 of wages paid to \$12.57 per \$100 of wages.

This good news for farmers will not alter the determination of the Agri-Business Council and others attempting to remuch needed revisions of the system itself. The announced decreases are based on a decline of losses and injury costs amongst farmers in the state and have nothing to do with the imbalance which still exists within the system.
