County Court Plans Use Of Revenue Sharing Funds

Roy Hirai, Malheur County Judge, released the County Court reports to the citizens of the County on General Revenue Sharing funds. He said they expect to receive \$155,025.00 for the period of January 1, 1973 to June 30, 1973. The planned use report as follows:

- 1 - Public Safety \$27,899.00
 - (a) 1 Deputy-part time
 - (b) 1 Deputy-full time
 - (c) 1 Jailer
 - (d) 1 Juvenile Counselor

- 2 - Environmental Protection \$6,821.00
 - (a) Planning and Zoning Coordinator
- 3 - Health Department \$13,235.00
 - (a) Sanitarian Trainee
 - (b) Nurse Aid
- 4 - Multi-purpose and General Gov't. \$7,839.00
 - (a) Courthouse equipment
- 5 - Public Safety \$8,000.00
 - (a) New Vehicles
- 6 - Aging - Nursing Home \$91,231.00

The total expenditure for Capital Outlay is \$107,070.00. Thus, with the operating and maintenance expenditure of \$47,955.00, the sum total of \$155,025.00 is planned in the local budget for fiscal 1973-74 year.

The impact of the use of General Revenue Sharing funds greatly expands the programs in various departments and updates and expands the purchase of new equipment for county government, that could not be modernized immediately. Revenue Sharing funds, in turn, will help prevent enacting a new major tax.

Experiment Station To Feature Super Grains

Malheur County farmers, businessmen agency representatives, fieldmen and others are invited to learn more about the potential of the so-called "super grain" or red wheat for livestock feed at a field day at the Malheur Experiment Station according to Malheur County Agent, Leeds Bailey. Other items to be viewed include corn and grain variety and fertilizer trials along with plantings of Triticale. Open house will be held at the Experiment Station to examine the trials on June 26 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. A second date of July 6 is on the agenda for persons unable to attend the earlier session.

The "super grain" is receiving more and more attention from livestock feeders, according to Bailey, because of its high lysine or high quality protein content. Bailey went on to say that the Experiment Station offers local producers and those associated with agriculture a first hand review of the exciting changes expected in agricultural technology and production.

Station Superintendent, Neil Hoffman, emphasized that he has 125 cereal varieties, varieties of corn, 68 different kinds of potatoes and several varieties of Triticale on test. Many fertilizer trials are also being carried out.

Bailey says the visitation will start promptly at 7:00 p.m. with a two-hour information packed agenda planned. Anyone interested in the program may attend either the June 26 or July 6 programs. Further information on the field day is available at the Malheur County Extension office.

Mayor George Cartwright of the City of Adrian has received notification from the U. S. Government that the city will receive \$2,378 in Federal Revenue Sharing funds for the period ending June 30, 1973.

Cartwright said that Adrian is contemplating construction of a sewer and water system, and the council is considering the purchase of property for this project.

Salary Set For Court Clerk

Judge Val Sloper, Malheur County, Monday, ruled against the Malheur County court in connection with its position on setting the salary rate for Donna Calhoun, Circuit Court secretary-reporter.

Judge Sloper overruled a demurrer which had been filed in Circuit Court by the county court against Mrs. Calhoun. Mrs. Calhoun had been given salary raises by Judge Jeff Dorroh Jr., which had been refused by the county court. Last year he asked that her salary be increased from \$375 to \$500 but the county court set it at \$415.

In his decision Monday, Judge Sloper ruled that the circuit court judge had the power to set the salary under Oregon Statute 8.330 and said the judge had the inherent power to incur whatever expenses either for physical facilities or personnel necessary to effectively and efficiently carry out the duties of the court.

FLOCK RESIGNS AS HOUSING CHAIRMAN

Vern Flock has resigned the chairmanship of the Treasure Valley Senior Citizen's Housing Board. The action was taken at the board's June 14 meeting and was effective immediately.

Flock is leaving the board to accept the job as manager of the senior citizen housing complex in Ontario.

Also effective June 14, Martin P. Gallagher is being replaced as vice-president by Ray Winters. Gallagher, however, will remain on the board.

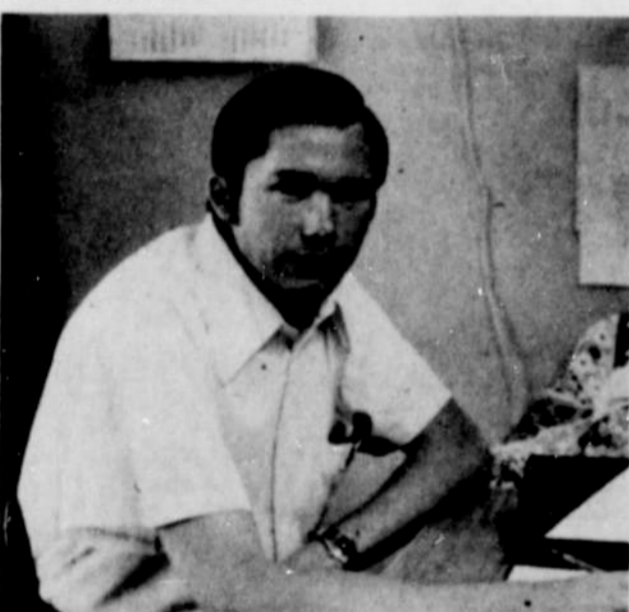
DAIRY PRINCESSES VISIT CHAMBER
