What does a teen-age Swedish girl find most exciting about her first visit to Nyssa?

"The drive-ins," says Ann-Marie Landquist of Faglum, Sweden. "They don't have them at home and I like ice cream so much."

Ann-Marie arrived in the United States last Wednesday, June 13, and has been staying here in Nyssa as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Kayno Saito and their daughter Jan.

During the summer of 1971 Jan went to Sweden on the American Field Service's summer exchange program, while there she lived in the Landquist home. The two girls became friends and now Ann-Marie is getting a chance to meet Jan's family and friends. Her trip, however, is not sponsored by the American Field Service.

Seventeen-year-old Ann-Marie, a farmer's daughter, comes from a small village in central Sweden. Her family, she said, grows five different kinds of grain on their farm. When she ends her three-week visit to this country, Ann-Marie said she plans to work in a concession stand at a swimming pool until school starts.

Mrs. Saito said the weather had disrupted some of her plans for Ann-Marie's stay, but she hoped they could get up to the Owyhee Dam area before Ann-Marie left Nyssa.

Ann-Marie said she likes Nyssa; especially, "the drive-ins." Also, she said she was surprised by the size of Ameri-

can cars. Jan said she planned to teach Ann-Marie how to drive--"out on some deserted backroad," hopefully.

This Wednesday morning, June 20, Ann-Marie, Jan, Mrs. Saito and Jeanine Saito, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Saito of Nyssa, will leave on a two-week trip down the west coast. Mrs. Saito said they will visit Portland, San Francisco and Disneyland in Los Angeles. During the trip they plan to see relatives and friends and show Ann-Marie some of this country.

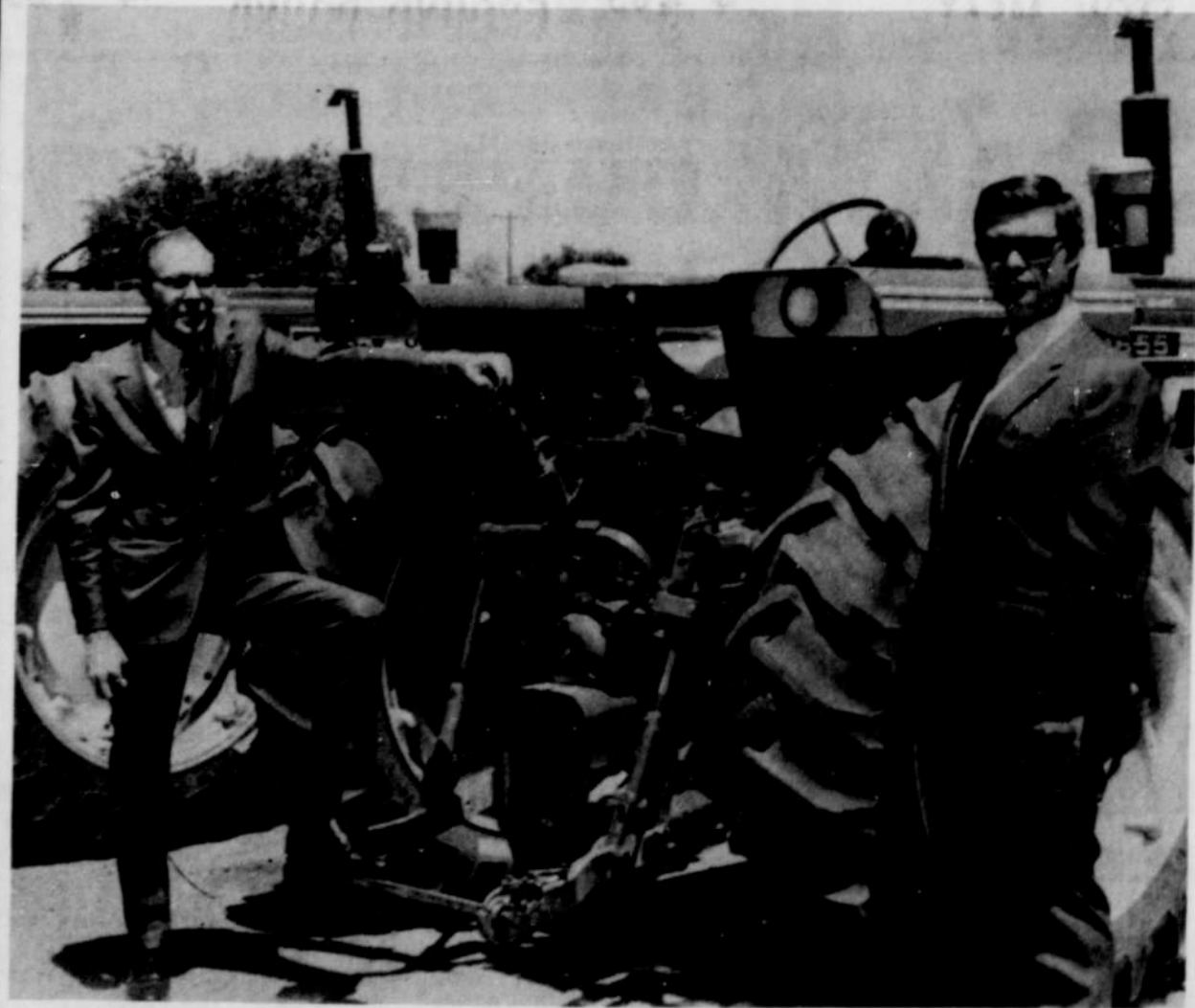
From Los Angeles they will return to San Francisco, where Ann-Marie will board a plane to return to Sweden; the others will return to Nyssa.
