



**Most Oregon Streams Safe**

Most Oregon streams and rivers are safe for swimming, reports the Department of Environmental Quality. However, DEQ laboratory tests show bacteriological conditions make water contact activities potentially hazardous in the Tualatin River system from Gaston to the river's mouth, Johnson Creek, Marys River below Philomath, Pudding River, Columbia Slough, Rickreall Creek, Bear Creek and the Malheur River. All other streams and rivers in the state are bacteriologically safe for water sports, but swimmers should avoid areas within about 100 yards of a sewage treatment plant or industrial outfall as a precaution against the possibility of a malfunctioning treatment system. DEQ also reports that no stream waters can be considered safe for drinking, because even in isolated areas there is a chance of recent, local contamination from upstream uses.

**Area Citizens Make Up Solid Waste Committee**

Citizens from all parts of the county make up the Solid Waste Committee. They represent farmers, planners, government and service organizations. These residents serve without pay to provide a better future for the county in solid waste management. Chairman Glen Schwarting, and Vice-Chairman Ralph Comnesser head the list of volunteers assisting Project Director Ray Huff and Coordinator Bruce Sarazin in Solid Waste Planning. Each committee member belongs to one or more of the four sub-committees in which his interests lie. The Legal-Legislative Subcommittee has the task of determining what, if any, city or county ordinances are necessary on solid waste. The purpose of such an ordinance would be to control promiscuous or unauthorized dumping that could endanger the health of county residents. Secondary results of such an ordinance would include the protection of our water resources and meeting requirements of federal and

state laws. Serving on this committee are two farmers William Panike, representing the County Planning Committee, and Sam Hartley, representing the County Court. The two private sanitation services are represented by Ontario's Bob O'Harra and Nyssa's Dean Lauderback. Shorty Brandt represents the North Board of Control and Kurt Swindburnson, the Assistant District Attorney. Rounding out the subcommittee is Dan Weeks of the Southeastern Oregon Council of Governments. The Technical Task Force Subcommittee represents many federal, state, and local government agencies. This committee is looking at the hows and wheres of our local solid waste. After determining how much refuse we produce and where we dispose of it, they will attempt to formulate a reasonable plan for the management of this waste for the next twenty years. This is not an easy task due to the variable effects of population growth, migration of people within the county, and the uncertainty of recycling. Further, both federal and state laws are in a continuous state of flux. To anticipate the direction they will have taken twenty years from now is not easy. Duane Town, from the SCS, works with Sheldon Saxton of the BLM, along with Dick Erickson (Vale) and Adam Focht (Owyhee) of the Irrigation districts. Other members include Howard Brooks, State Department of Geology, Clayton Ansell, State Highway Division, Darold Walker, State Parks, and Burt Lewis, State Lands Division. Private industry is represented by Bob O'Harra (Ontario) and Clarence Page (Nyssa) of the sanitation services and Glen Schwarting, Ore-Ida Foods. The county is represented by Walt Gillespie, Engineer. These two subcommittees along with the Organization-Administration and Finance Subcommittee and the Public Information Subcommittee make up the Solid Waste Advisory Council. Next weeks news release will discuss these other two committees.

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cup peanut butter  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
1 egg  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
1 1/4 cups sifted flour  
3/4 tsp. soda  
1/2 tsp. salt  
Thoroughly cream butter, peanut butter, sugars, egg, vanilla. Sift together dry ingredients, blend into creamed mixture. Shape into 1" balls, roll in sugar. Place on ungreased cookie sheet, press with fork tines. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes. Cool slightly. Remove from pan. Makes about 4 dozen.
