Most Oregon Streams Safe

Most Oregon streams and rivers are safe for swimming, reports the Department of Environmental Quality.

However, DEQ laboratory tests show bacteriological conditions make water contact ac-Gaston to the river's mouth, Johnson Creek, Marys River Columbia Slough, Rickreall Creek, Bear Creek and the Malheur River.

All other streams and rivers safe for water sports, but swimmers should avoid areas within about 100 yards of a sewage treatment plant or industrial outfall as a precaution against the possibility of a malfunctioning treatment system.

DEQ also reports that no stream waters can be considered safe for drinking, because even in isolated areas there is a chance of recent, local contamination from upstream uses.
