

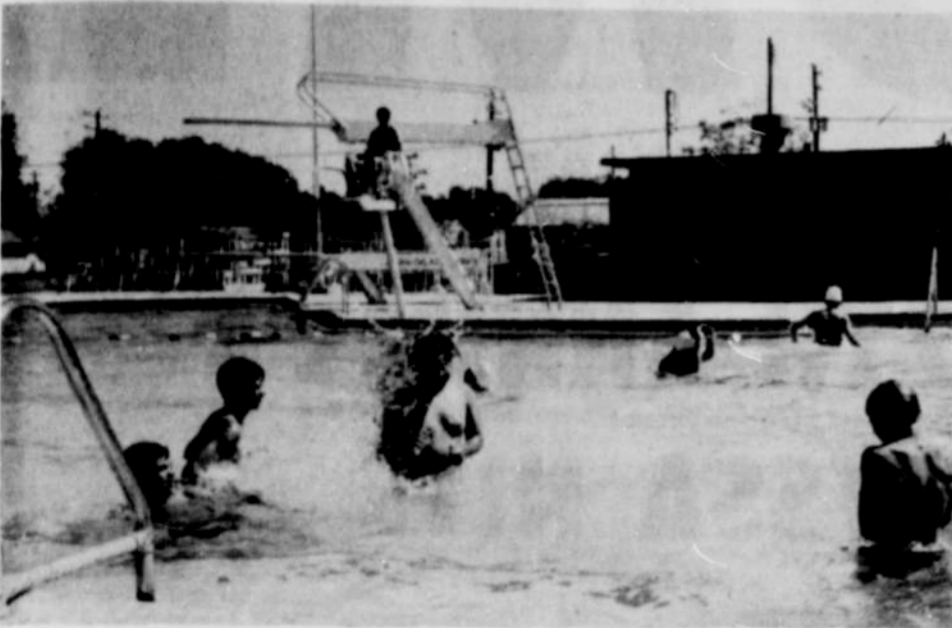

Permits Required In Seven Wilderness Areas

Wilderness users are reminded they will need a permit this summer to enter seven of 14 Wildernesses within the National Forests of the Pacific Northwest. The reminder was issued by the U. S. Forest Service in advance of the start of this year's permit season on June 15. The permit system will remain in effect until November 15. Included in the system for 1973 are the Eagle Cap, Mt. Jefferson, and Three Sisters Wilderness areas in Oregon, and Glacier Peak, Goat Rocks, Mt. Adams, and Pasayten Wildernesses in Washington. Regional Forester Theodore A.

Schlapper said these are the most heavily used and the largest areas with the most serious management problems. Permits will be issued in person and by mail by the National Forests where a Wilderness is located, except where a popular Wilderness portal is through an adjoining Forest. Mail applications can be obtained at any Forest Service office. Use of the free permit will enable the Forest Service to advise visitors about specific regulations and measures being taken to protect the Wilderness environment of the areas to be visited.

Ranchers Complete Sagebrush Control on 8,000 Acres

Ranchers this week completed sagebrush control on over 8,000 acres of private rangelands according to George Bain, County Extension Agent. This work was done on ranges in Ironside, Jordan Valley, and Ontario-Vale area as well as a considerable acreage near Jun-tura. Spray application was done by helicopter furnished by Mountain Air Helicopters of Salem, Oregon. Chemical was furnished by Aero Range Service of Lakeview, Oregon. These firms were successful bidders on a bid on all acreages pooled last spring.

The program was organized and supervised by County Extension Agent George Bain. Bain says those using this range improvement procedure can expect those areas treated to produce twice as much range forage as they did previously. This spectacular improvement is due to release of the moisture previously utilized by the dense stands of sagebrush as well as the plant nutrients the brush saps from the soil it occupies. This program is organized each year during the winter months says Bain.

OREGON TRAFFIC VOLUME INCREASES

Traffic volume on most of Oregon's highways showed an increase in vehicular traffic in March, 1973 compared to March of 1972, according to the monthly report compiled by the Oregon State Highway Division. A summary of traffic recorder data for rural and urban state highways showed an increase of 9.1 per cent in vehicular traffic in March, 1973 compared to March, 1972.

The first three months of 1973 showed an increase of 10.2 per cent in vehicular traffic compared to the first three months of 1972.

BIGHORN, DEER APPLICATIONS DUE

Sportsmen are reminded that they have about a month remaining in which to apply for bighorn sheep and August deer season permits. These applications must be received at the Game Commission office in Portland by 5 p.m., July 17 to be eligible for the drawing scheduled at 10 a.m. on July 27.

Applications for sheep tags must be made on the "Controlled Hunt Application Card" which is available at all license agencies. Ten sheep permits will be issued this year in the Steens Mountain and Owyhee units.

Hunters who wish to participate in the Jackson or Josephine Agricultural Area hunts should apply on the application issued with the general deer tag.

FIELD INSPECTION DEADLINE NEARS

Oregon certified grain and red clover seed growers are reminded that the deadline for filing applications for field inspection is July 1 according to Malheur County Extension Agent, Leeds Bailey. He also pointed out that alfalfa seed growers have one month's grace and won't have to file until August 1.

Certification regulations and application forms are available at the County Extension office in Ontario.

Sheep Profit Task Force

In 1973, the "Sheep for Profit Task Force" was organized to evaluate and study the sheep industry in the area of marketing. This program is being conducted in cooperation with your local Extension Service, local wool pool and the Sheep Industry Development Council (S.I.D.). A committee made up of Oregon and Idaho members of S.I.D. has been meeting to consider ways to increase the marketing alternatives for lambs produced in Eastern Oregon and Southwestern Idaho.

An informational survey will be forthcoming. This survey is needed to determine the numbers and kinds of lambs and their present marketing systems in the Southwestern Idaho and Eastern Oregon areas. Questions are also being asked about management practices, lamb and ewe losses, and general information about the sheep industry in this area. Data collected will be held in strict confidence.

If you are interested in a more profitable market and a better means of marketing your lambs, study and fill out the survey when it arrives. The information you send in will be of importance in improving your industry's market potential.
