OUT OF THE PAST

10 YEARS AGO
 Nyssa and Adrian mail users will have new zip code numbers effective July 1, according to joint announcements by Postmaster Lee Dail of Nyssa and Glenwood Pounds of Adrian.

The old Tensen-Van Gilse building one of Nyssa's early day structures, soon will be razed. It is located on the south side of Main, just east of First Street, where the steep portion has stood for 53 years, having been erected in 1910 by Dick Tensen, Sr. The west portion was built the following year by Henry Van Gilse.

The city recently obtained the building for delinquent taxes. City manager Art Colby has stated that present plans include the planting of grass and trees which eventually will be a small attractive park area.

20 YEARS AGO
 Pvt. James D. Hille, 17, was killed in action against the enemy in Korea June 6. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Hille of Nyssa and the first Nyssa area man to die in action in the Korean war. Arrangements to send the body back to Nyssa for burial are pending.

Installation of yield right-of-way signs at intersections of Good and Park Avenues to make both avenues through streets, was completed Monday, City Manager E.K. Burton announced.

30 YEARS AGO
 Oregon will not have a state fair in 1943, the state director of agriculture, E.L. Peterson announced following an executive meeting, the first semi-annual session of 1943 with the state board of agriculture in Salem June 16, when the matter was discussed from all angles and unanimous agreements reached that the war demands that all efforts of the part of agriculture be directed toward the production of food.

Only 17 persons cast ballots in the election held by the new consolidated school district No. 26 of Malheur County Monday.

All three candidates were elected unanimously. They were Loyd Adams for the five-year term, R.G. Larson for the three-year term and B.B. Lienkaemper for the one-year term.

60 YEARS AGO
 Sixty-five thousand acres of land in the vicinity of Nyssa that have been included in an oil reserve and not subject to homestead or desert entry will soon be open to settlement, the director of the geological survey having reported that the lands were not valuable for the purpose for which withdrawn.

Under the executive order dated May 19, 1913, received by Bruce Kester, register of the U.S. land office at Vale, these lands become subject to settlement under the general provisions of the homestead law from and after 9 o'clock a.m., July 18, 1913, but shall not become subject to entry, filing selection or other form of appropriation until August 18, 1913, and no person shall be permitted to gain or exercise any right whatever under any settlement or occupation begun prior to the date of settlement fixed herein.
