High Heels for Men Are Accident Prone

Tripping the light fantastic with high-heeled, platform sole shoes may be the latest in shoe styles for men, but it may spell trouble!

National Safety Council Home Safety Information Specialist Mary Anderson sees trouble afoot for care-less male cloggers. "The extreme height, weight and rigidity of the shoe—or the bucket-on-each-foot feeling, decreases mobility, balance and speed," notes Ms. Anderson. "The possibilities of injuries caused by falls and twisted ankles are greatly heightened when you pair the average man or boy with platform shoes."

"Watching your step and one foot at a time, or what I call creative walking is the key to keeping your ground with platform shoes," she says. "Judge each movement with your heels in mind," she suggests, "and allow for the deeper toe area at each step, curb, or any floor level change."

Need to Know**

When it comes to home improvement, haste can waste a lot of money. Plan ahead first says Building Supply News, a trade publication. It advises homeowners to plan remodeling projects carefully, with professional advice and specific information to avoid expensive pitfalls.

Other helpful suggestions include:

- Make a list of the exact improvements you want and the benefits from them. Set a realistic price range.

- Take your plans to a reliable contractor or building supply dealer. If you don't know the local "pros," ask contractors for references you can contact.

- Get a detailed written job specification from the remodeler. This should include a complete list of materials to be used, labor and services to be provided, and carefully estimated costs.

- Check on local building codes; on building permits and who will get them; on permit fees and who will pay them.

- Find out if the remodeler carries public liability insurance. Be sure you're protected if someone is injured on the job.
