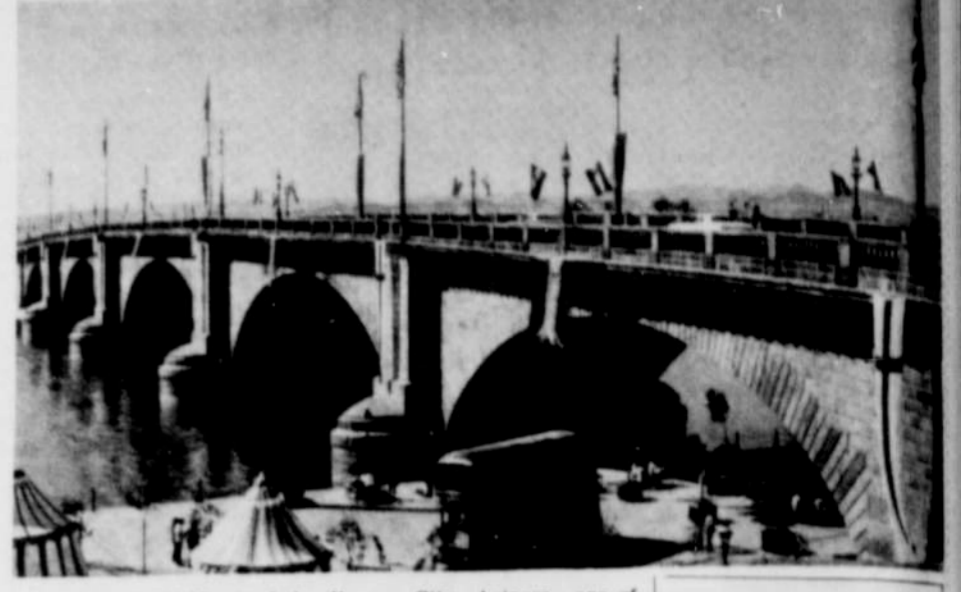

Malheur Home Economist's Meetings to Feature Canning

It's time to get ready for the canning season, reminds Helen Conner, Malheur County Extension Home Economist.

To help homemakers do this the Malheur County Extension Service is offering several free educational meetings on food preservation in late June and July.

Meetings are planned to bring homemakers up-to-date on current methods as well as to help the beginner learn the necessary skills so they will have a top quality product. Two types of meetings are planned and homemakers may attend the one that best fits their needs.

Red meat per capita consumption figures used most commonly by the government and the livestock and meat trades, and by other news media are computed on a carcass weight basis. In general, meat packer-wholesalers sell carcass halves or quarters to retail outlets. Therefore, the basis for red meat per capita consumption figures is the wholesale level of distribution, rather than the retail level.

CONSUMER HAS SAY. Do you buy ready-made meat patties? The U. S. Department of Agriculture proposes setting up two categories for these products so you'll know what you're getting.

"Meat patties" would be made of ground meat which could contain up to 30 percent added fat plus seasonings. If made of beef, they would be called "beef patties."

"Patties with meat" would have to contain at least 60 percent meat, and not more than 30 percent of the meat content could be fat. They could contain other ingredients like meat byproducts, poultry products, soy products, water, cereal and starches, plus seasonings. In-

redient percentages would be listed. These products would have to contain at least 13.5 percent protein of a quality to insure at least 90 percent of the protein equivalent of a "meat patty."

Do you approve or disapprove this proposal? Write, by July 6, to USDA Hearing Clerk, Washington, D. C. 20250, in duplicate.

THE U. S. Department of Agriculture is inviting comments on a new proposal that would allow manufacturers to call a nutritionally fortified product by a fanciful or distinctive name as long as the product compares favorably in nutritional value with the product it resembles. The quality and quantity of protein and the mineral and vitamin content in the nutritionally fortified meat product would have to equal 90 to 150 percent of these substances in the meat product it resembles. Listing all ingredients by name is already required, and would continue to be.

If you have comments, send them in duplicate to the USDA Hearing Clerk, Washington, D.C. 20250, by July 6.
