### Army ROTC Opened To OSU College Women

Army ROTC commissions will be open for women on the same basis as men beginning this fall at Oregon State University. The national change comes as OSU prepares to start its 101st year of military instruction. Army ROTC classes have been open to women on either a credit or audit basis and a few OSU coeds (including one this June) have been commissioned under special Women's Army

Corps programs. But regular ROTC commissions have been restricted previously to men. That will change this fall, says Col. E. J. Fulsang, professor of military science. Women are being actively sought, he emphasized, to become regular ROTC students who can be commissioned as second lieutenants at graduation along with receiving their degrees in a regular academic school.

Scholarship programs offered by the Army will apply to women also. These pay \$100 a month subsistence allowance for the four college years plus all tuition, fees and books. "Women interested in applying or receiving additional details on the program are urged to write our office," Col Fulsang said. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age and not more than 21. The OSU Air Force ROTC

unit commissioned its first woman officer June 15. And the university's Naval Science unit, which also includes a Marine Corps option, announced in May that women were authorized to participate as either scholarship or non-scholarship students. Army action makes it unanimous. OSU is one of only 33 universities in the nation that offers ROTC in all branches of service.

### 4-H Summer Camp Planned

Plans for the 1973 4-H summer camp are starting to take shape. Applications are being received and counselors organized, stated Ron Mobley. The camp is slated for July 18 to 21 at Lake Creek Camp. Camp activities will include evening camp fires, fishing, hiking, native craft, investigations, frog races, meeting new friends and having fun.

The camp is located in Logan Valley, which is at the head waters of the Malheur River, an ideal setting for camping. The camp is a 4-H activity, however, all young people between 9 and 14 years of age are invited to participate. The cost of camp is \$18 which includes meals, lodging, insurance, materials, and transportation. As camper applications are received, bus schedules will be developed. Lake Creek Camp is well equipped with lodge, kitchen, rest room facilities, A-frame cabins and recreation equipment. Campers will need to bring sleeping bags, hiking shoes, warm clothing, rain gear, fishing equipment, insect repellent and enthusiasm.

Mobley concluded by saying that there is still room for several more campers. However, applications should be turned into the Malheur County Extension office as soon as possible. Anyone wishing more information concerning the camp may contact the Extension office at 889-9129.
