Brown Spots In Lawns

Brown spots in lawns caused by insect damage are beginning to show up in Treasure Valley lawns again this summer according to Malheur County Extension Agent Leeds Bailey.

He says the problem is caused by the larval form of a black, long snouted beetle called the billbug. These insects lay eggs in bluegrass lawns from May to July. The eggs hatch into tiny grubs that grow and feed on the grass crowns and roots. Damaged areas range from small dead spots in lawns to almost complete devastation where infestations are severe. Control consists of applying appropriate insecticides as soon as initial damage is noted.

Bailey observed that billbug damage is often attributed to lawn moths. He indicated that many of the lawn moths seen during the summer period have no connection with lawn damage. Those that do are the adult phase of the sod webworm that occasionally causes trouble in heavy turf. The larvae phase of the sod webworm is a caterpillar like larvae that does occasional damage in Treasure Valley, Bailey concluded.

ARMY EXTENDS ENLISTMENT BONUS

The Army has extended its \$2,500 enlistment bonus for qualified high school graduates. The bonus, which had been scheduled to expire June 30, still is available to qualified applicants who enlist for Armor, Artillery, or Infantry.

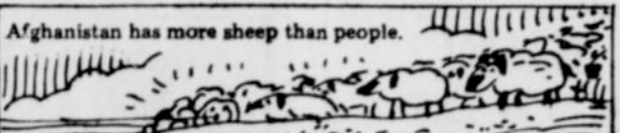
Lt. Col. Darrell G. Waller, Commander of recruiting activities for southern Idaho and eastern Oregon, said the bonus is offered for four year enlistments when prospective enlistees meet normal mental, physical and moral standards.

Waller said the bonus is payable upon completion of basic training and the award of a military occupation specialty which certifies the soldier is qualified to perform in his military job.
