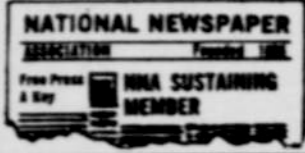

OREGON, IDAHO SENATORS INTRODUCE LEGISLATION FOR HELLS CANYON AREA

Senators Frank Church, Mark Hatfield, Bob Packwood and James McClure introduced legislation Monday to create a new Hells Canyon National Recreation Area. Their action follows several months of meetings between the Oregon and Idaho Senators and represents a consensus among the four lawmakers on the best management plan for the Hells Canyon region.

the Forest Service in acquiring private lands.

—Preservation of multiple use management for all parts of the recreation area, excepting wilderness.

—A authorization of funds to improve public access to Hells Canyon at Pittsburg Landing on the Idaho side of the river and at Dug Bar on the Oregon side.

—Designation of the Snake River, between Hells Canyon Dam and Asotin, Washington, as part of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System.

—Deauthorization of the proposed Asotin Dam on the Snake River.

—A study of the Rapid River drainage on the Idaho side, and of lands within the Recreation Area on the Oregon side, for possible future inclusion in the National Wilderness System.

The legislation introduced Monday is the latest chapter in a years' long effort to protect Hells Canyon and the Middle Snake, the bill represents the first time that all Idaho and Oregon Senators have reached agreement on the approach to be taken.

—The total prohibition on construction of any further dams along the Middle Snake River in Hells Canyon.

—Language which protects upstream water rights in Idaho.

—A specific directive that existing grazing on public lands within the Recreation Area and the Wilderness Area shall be allowed to continue.

—Limitation on the current condemnation powers exercised by
