Last weekend this area's American Legion Baseball team, the Malheur Stars, won the District title by defeating Milton-Freewater two out of three games, in Milton-Freewater.

Local boys who play for the stars and played in the District Play-offs include: Dwight Calhoun, Nyssa; Stuart Ward, Adrian; and Dennis Beebe, also of Adrian.

Dwight was the leading hitter for the Stars with five hits--two doubles, and a bases loaded home run. Dwight had ten runs

batted in for the series with nine of them coming in the first game.

Stuart Ward started the first game at shortstop and relieved during the 5th inning to put down a Milton-Freewater rally. Stuart pitched 4 1/3 innings and struck out six batters.

SHEEP AND ELK TAG

DRAWINGS HELD

Applications for 10 bighorn sheep tags and 75 permits for the Middle Mountain elk permit hunt were pulled from the hopper in a public drawing held Friday, July 27, at the Game Commission's Portland headquarters.

The drawing sequence for the Middle Mountain hunt was 8, 1, 5, 4, 7, and 0. All hunters whose application number ended in any of the first five numbers listed will receive permits. Three out of eight applicants with numbers ending in 0 were also successful. Three individuals received priority in the drawing by submitting five or more unsuccessful notices with their applications.

Sportsmen present at the drawing selected the ten lucky names for bighorn sheep tags from a hopper containing a total of more than 1,500 applications.

The successful names drawn for two Owyhee Unit tags from 226 applicants were Jim Greeley of Jordan Valley and Heike Fry from Hillsboro.

Hunters successful for the Steens Mountain bighorn sheep hunt included Bob Towe, Redmond; Robert Adams, Gresham; James Wisor, Klamath Falls; Kenneth Meserve, Burns; Leonard S. Stone, Portland; Charles Edwards, Eugene; Joe Hudson, North Bend; and Roberta Burk, Eagle Point. These lucky eight were drawn from a field of 1,295 applicants.

Alternates were selected in the event any of these sheep applicants decline to purchase their tag.

At a local meet on July 17, Julie thrilled spectators with her performance in a special race against two older male members of the swimming team. Julie stayed even with the guys through the first lap and then overpowered them to capture the victory on the last lap.

"The main reason I wanted to swim with them," said Julie, "is I wanted to make my time, so I decided to swim with them so they could push me. I couldn't believe I beat them."

"It felt good," said Julie with an impish grin. "Boys are supposed to swim faster and when you swim and beat them it really makes you feel good."

"I was really psyched up for that one," said Julie. "I wanted to beat them and I wanted to get my time."

Julie claims, however, that she isn't into the women's lib movement, yet.

Julie is looking ahead to the State Meet and feels the competition will be rough; she already has a good idea of who she'll have to beat to win some medals.

"When you get at state," said Julie, "you always swim faster because you're scared and there's more competition."

Someday, Julie says she'd like to swim for a college and eventually teach physical education. Also, she says she would like to coach a swimming team and have a pool available for her own practice.

For the moment, however, Julie is starting to "psych" herself up for the State Meet. But, after that, Mark Spitz--look out!

Malheur County Fair Board Outlines Parking Situation

Parking space at the Malheur County Fairgrounds has been at a premium over the past few years, but this year additional parking on the grounds is being provided, according to the Malheur County Fair Board.

It is essential, says the Fair Board, that fire traffic lanes be maintained throughout the grounds. For this reason the Fair Board is closing the main gate to the fairgrounds to vehicular traffic Monday through Saturday of Fair Week--August 12-18.

There are two other entrances to the grounds: the South Gate which will permit access to the south half of the parking lot west of the livestock barns, and the West Gate on Park Avenue which will give access to the north half of the parking lots behind the Commercial and Main Exhibit Hall and also to the Horse Barn area.

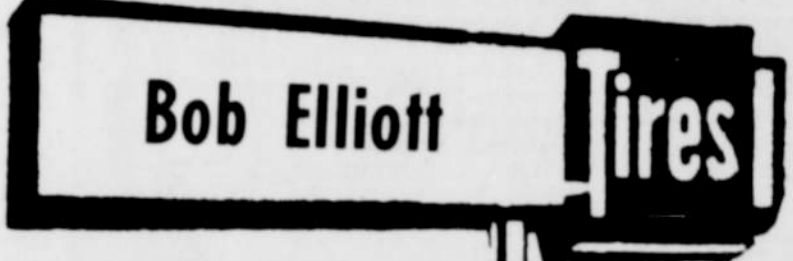
Parking at the fair this year, according to the Fair Board, will follow this general outline:

Exhibitors--livestock area: A new area has been opened up west of the ditch. There are a few trees and this area is reserved for those who bring campers and trailers to the fair. This is not designated as a camping area, but one in which you may park this type of vehicle.

Trucks and other vehicles belonging to exhibitors in the livestock area are encouraged to park in the south half of the large parking area just west of the barns.

Exhibitors--Commercial Building, Main Exhibit Hall and Log Cabins: The most convenient area is the one immediately west of these buildings. In this way all material can be taken in the back doors of the Commercial Building, or the end doors of the Main Exhibit Hall.

Exhibitors--Horse Barns and under Grandstand: There is some parking area behind the horse barns, and also the north end of the parking area behind the Commercial Building.
