These are some of the reasons, in our opinion, why people are angry. That is why we further believe that, as the hearings drag on, public reaction is going to swing more and more against the members of the committee who are displaying such zealous diligence in going after the witnesses appearing before them.

And we also agree with the president and hope that he never releases any of the confidential tapes of White House conversations. Can you imagine the delight that this committee would take in exposing almost any conversation, taken out of context, between almost any individual at any level.

It seems a shame to me that with all of the tremendously important issues that are before congress, the president, and our nation's leaders, that their attention and time must be diverted by this seemingly endless theatrical display of harassment and character assassination.

Nyssa Youth Hospitalized

A Nyssa youth was injured Monday when the motorcycle he was riding collided with another on King Avenue west of Highway 20.

Terry R. Mason 16, Nyssa, was taken to Malheur Memorial Hospital in Nyssa. He was listed in "fairly good" condition Tuesday.

A vehicle operated by Paul T. Hopper Jr., 16, Ontario, entered King Avenue from a muddy roadway and slid in front of a motorbike driven by Mason. The Mason vehicle was struck in the front tire by the Hopper bike and plummeted to the ground.

Hopper was cited by Oregon State Police for failure to maintain control of his vehicle. Mason was cited for switched license plates.

ROLLOVER KILLS MAN NEAR NYSSA

An Ontario man was pronounced dead on arrival at a Boise hospital late Sunday night after a four-wheel-drive vehicle rolled over near Nyssa.

Oregon State Police reported Daniel C. Nelson, 20, Ontario, the driver, was pinned under the vehicle after it rolled down a hill. He was taken to a hospital in Ontario and then to Boise.

His passenger, Darrell Carr, 22, also Ontario, was thrown clear of the vehicle and suffered minor injuries, police said. The accident happened about 10 p.m., Sunday as the two were hill climbing on private property southwest of Nyssa at the end of Overstreet Road near the Owyhee River.
