Market Basket

Local and far-away fields and orchards are yielding a variety of summer fruits, says Velma Seat, Extension Food Marketing Specialist, Oregon State University.

Beautiful big blueberries are in the markets. Prices will come down a bit later in the month as supplies increase. Red Haven Peaches and Apricots are from Washington State. All varieties of Plums are plentiful. The California Nectarine crop is a big one. Sweet, juicy Thompson seedless Grapes are available.

The best Cantaloupes we have seen this year are now in the markets. Look for melons that have a coarse, corky netting, a golden background color and an aromatic cantaloupe fragrance.

Gas Shortage Can Save Lives

The national gasoline shortage facing vacationers this summer could prove to be a life-saving benefit to motorists, according to the Oregon Association of Insurance Agents.

"Oil companies are advising us that reducing our cruising speeds from 60 to 50 mph can improve our gas mileage by as much as 10 percent," said Gordon T. Wood, Roseburg, president of the association. "Reducing our speed by the same 10 mph can improve our chances of preventing an accident or meeting an emergency successfully by nearly 35 percent."

He pointed out that stopping a car traveling at 60 miles per hour takes 366 feet, while at 50 mph, a complete stop requires only 243 feet. These figures include an initial reaction distance for the driver to an emergency of 66 feet at 60 mph and 55 feet at 50 mph.

"These distances not only point out the need for all drivers to be fully alert at all times, and the rapid closing speeds on potentially dangerous situations, but they are based on optimum conditions. The cars, drivers, brakes, tires and weather were all ideal. Add in any adverse factor such as worn brakes, tires or wet weather, and you have real trouble," Mr. Wood said.

It is expected that as many as 115 million Americans will vacation this year in some 40 million cars. This will put a greater stress on the country's available fuel supply as well as stress on the safety factors built into interstate and other highways.

OAAA suggests that good planning will make these vacations more enjoyable and safer. The state independent agents suggest the following:

—Carefully plan your trip by the route to be used and the time necessary to get to your destination. Build into it extra time for reduced speed to improve gas mileage, for example: allow six hours instead of five to cover 300 miles.

—Have your car completely checked by a qualified mechanic. Have him pay special attention to brakes, shock absorbers, wheel alignment and balance.

—Get the engine tuned, a well-tuned engine uses less gas.

—Replace worn tires, including spare, don't take chances. Make sure you maintain proper air pressure in all tires.

—Don't overload the car with unnecessary gear. Today's permanent press materials for men and women are ideal for long trips. The availability of laundromats in the smallest communities can solve clothing problems.

—Just in case, carry at least two gallons of gas in an approved container. Some stations are being rationed now and may be sold out just when you need it the most.

—Make sure all drivers have their licenses with them. Switching off from behind the wheel will keep everyone relaxed.

—Also, make sure your auto insurance is adequate to cover all situations. States have different requirements and travel in Canada or Mexico needs special consideration. Check with your independent agent.

Idaho Power Announces Nuclear Power Research

Idaho Power Company announced Wednesday that it has helped to establish a research fellowship at the University of California, San Diego, for work relating to an advanced nuclear power plant concept.

The new research will include investigation of materials behavior, component design, and environmental aspects of the system.

Hall said Idaho Power's membership in the HTGR group, totaling 53 companies, was "only a single instance" of its participation in a wide variety of research and development programs.

"These programs, in which Idaho Power has taken part alone or in joint venture with other utilities, have ranged from new electric energy sources to pollution-control equipment to migrant-fish conservation," he said.

Idaho Power now is participating in an industry-wide, cost-sharing research program aimed at developing clean and efficient new sources of low-cost electric energy.

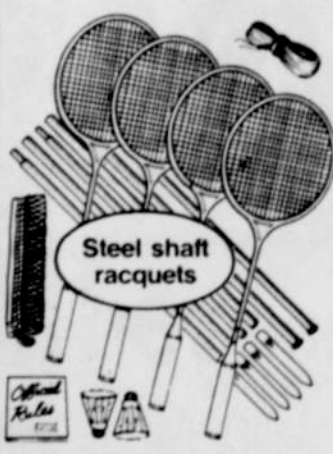
Under the program, 98 utilities have pledged some \$215 million toward the cost of developing a commercial-type breeder reactor that would produce more nuclear fuel than it consumes and thus is expected to extend the usefulness of known uranium reserves for thousands of years.

Hall pointed out that electric utilities are "constantly" working with equipment manufacturers and others to improve the efficiency of energy conversion devices, of transmission and distribution facilities, and of the nation's interconnected power systems.

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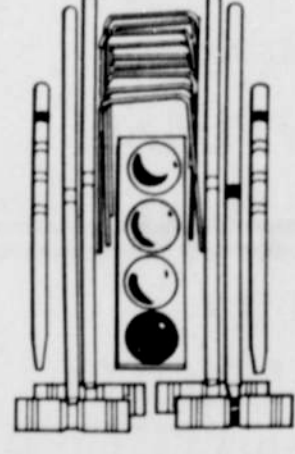
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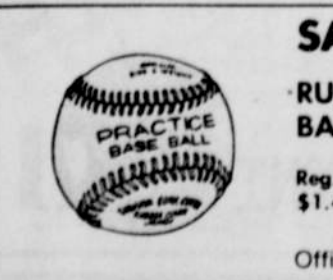
