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### OUT OF THE PAST

#### 10 YEARS AGO

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the office building of Ideal Gas and appliance Company at 14 North First Street in Nyssa early Wednesday evening. A worker in the nearby Muir-Roberts potato shed called in the report.

An overnight rest stop and picnic park adjacent to the Snake River, was designed and established by the City of Nyssa. It is located on the Oregon side at the end of the bridge and when traveling east is to the right of Highway 20-26.

A severe electrical storm, accompanied by heavy thunder and followed by a short downpour of rain, hit Nyssa Sunday night but did little damage, according to reports from the local utility companies.

#### 20 YEARS AGO

A revived potato market, described by some growers and shippers as a "complete but pleasant surprise," started spuds rolling in trucks from the fields Monday and threw packing houses in Nyssa and adjacent area into full-scale operations after a lull of approximately three weeks.

A feature article paying tribute to Don M. Graham of Nyssa appeared in the August issue of Salt Lake Recruiter, monthly publication of the U.S. Navy recruiting station and office of naval officer procurement of Salt Lake.

#### 30 YEARS AGO

Possibility of establishment of a war prisoner camp between Nyssa and Adrian was rumored here this week. Whether the camp will be established in Malheur County, or at all, could not be learned. The camp, which would cost more than \$1,000,000, would be constructed to accommodate 2000 prisoners. The prisoners, mostly Italians, would be used on local farms as laborers at a "going" wage.

Approximately 400 acres of land would be required for the camp, which the government apparently proposes to erect at Owyhee corner. About 400 soldiers would be needed to guard the prisoners.

Two thousand dollars worth of war bonds and stamps were sold in Nyssa Saturday during the Molly Pitcher day campaign,

Mrs. Walter L. Thompson, Nyssa chairman, announced.

Several organizations assisted in the drive.

Roscoe Kellogg of the Gate City Dairy, working with the department of agriculture, the city council and the city health officer, announced this week that starting the first of next week he will be in a position to furnish pasteurized milk to the city of Nyssa.

#### 40 YEARS AGO

The price of sugar set a new low record in Nyssa Saturday when it touched bottom at \$2.15 per hundred at the close of a "sugar" war between Wilson Brothers' Grocery and Halverson's Pure Food Store. Many shoppers rushed into one or both stores to lay in the winter's supply of sweets at the unusual prices. The streets were crowded with on lookers who were taking in the battle which ranged from \$4.95 downward.

One shopper was heard to remark that he hadn't enjoyed a fight so much since the "bacon war" of two years back.

Lovely water lilies, in shades of red, cream and shell pink, opened their dainty petals to charm the many ladies who attended the August meeting of Nyssa Civic Club yesterday at the Barrett garden.

This season is not considered a flower year but Mrs. Barrett has her always beautiful array of zinnias, phlox, marigolds, daisies, and the rarer flowers which cannot be found in the average garden.

#### 50 YEARS AGO

In the course of some investigations recently in the interior of Malheur County, officers of the county came upon a family which presents an interesting human interest study. There are several boys and two young women in the family. The daughters are both over legal age and have gone through public school yet they have never left their immediate neighborhood. They have seen a railroad train but once and the largest town ever visited has less than 100 inhabitants.

Poverty is not responsible, as the family is fairly well to do in ranch land and livestock. Neither has lack of transportation facilities kept these young women isolated from the world,

as there are two automobiles in the family.

#### 60 YEARS AGO
