

Nyssa Swimmers Win Medals At A State Meet In Idaho

Julie Anderson, 15, and Todd Langley, 8, both of Nyssa, won medals at the A State Swimming Meet last weekend, August 10 and 11, at Blackfoot, Idaho.

This was the first year on the Nyssa Swimming Team for Todd, and he ended an outstanding season by winning a Third Place Medal in the 50-yard backstroke for the 8-and-under age group.

Julie won four medals at the Blackfoot meet and set a state record in the process. Swimming in the 15-to-17 group, Julie placed first in the 50-yard freestyle and first in the 100-yard freestyle. Also, she placed third in the 100-yard butterfly and third in the 200-yard Individual Medley.

Julie's time for the 50-yard freestyle, 27.1 seconds, broke the State Record, according to Mary Ann Dority, Nyssa swimming coach.

Also swimming in the Blackfoot meet, said coach Dority, were Mike Wahlert and Sheila Joyce.

Livestock Sale Planned

You can buy all the meat you want Friday, August 17, at 7:00 p.m., during the Junior Livestock Sale at the Malheur County Fairgrounds, according to Russell Hursh, Chairman of the Junior Sale Committee for the 1973 County Fair.

Junior exhibitors at the fair will put their meat projects through the auction held each year at the fair. The sale this year will include 60-100 beefs, 45-75 swine, and 50-80 lambs, Hursh says.

These animals are sold to the highest bidder who can have them delivered free of charge to the slaughter house of their choice to be processed at the purchaser's expense.

The animals sold must meet minimum quality standards. Steers must grade good or better, lambs good or better, and swine in the USDA grades of Choice 1, 2, or 3.

These animals are the result of many weeks of work by the 4-H and FFA members. They will be delivered Saturday following the fair to the destination designated by the purchaser.

NATIONAL HUNTING AND FISHING DAY SET FOR SEPT. 22

Conservation groups and sportsmen's clubs throughout the state are planning the second National Hunting and Fishing Day celebration scheduled for Saturday, September 22. President Richard M. Nixon and Oregon Governor Tom McCall have both given their support to this day of special recognition for America's hunters and fishermen because of their contributions to recreation, conservation, and the economy.

NHF Day began in 1972 to acquaint more people with resource conservation activities and benefits and responsibilities of outdoor recreation. Some 3,000 organizations held NHF Day programs in 1972 with total attendance exceeding four million people. The number of programs is anticipated to be far greater in 1973 with total attendance expected to top 15 million.

IT'S A GASSER

This first dirigible to be built in West Germany since 1945 is 197 feet long, 48 feet wide, and cruises at 62 miles an hour.



Filled with helium, which can't burn, the airship can carry seven passengers and flies at an altitude of about 5,000 feet, powered by two Rolls Royce engines.

Seeing the dirigible at night can be an illuminating experience, for 5,000 colored electric lights shine from the exterior. The dirigible was built at the Essen/Mulheim Airport in West Germany, and is now flying for an advertising firm. A second dirigible will soon be delivered to Japan where it will be used as a flying laboratory.

ELK AND COUGAR APPLICATIONS DUE

Oregon hunters have less than two weeks left in which to apply for antlerless elk permits and cougar tags. In order to be eligible for the drawing, applications must be received by 5 p.m. on August 21 at the Game Commission's Portland headquarters. The public drawing will be held at 10 a.m. on August 31.

The Game Commission reminds hunters that applications for elk permits should be made on the forms provided when they purchase their elk tag. Cougar tag applications should be made on the special tag application card also available at all license agencies. Some 83 cougar tags will be issued for a season extending from December 1 through 31, but the tags will be limited to more specific areas than has been true in past years.

Game Director Orders Extra Law Enforcement

The Oregon Game Commission will aggressively assist the State Police during the next four months to reduce illegal poaching, according to State Game Director John W. McKean.

Reports indicate a sharp increase in illegal taking of fish and wildlife, he said, apparently as a result of the price and supply squeeze on domestic meats. McKean has issued a memo to all Game Commission personnel directing them to place a high priority on law enforcement.

Wildlife laws in Oregon are normally enforced by the Game Division of the State Police; however, 190 Game Commission employees are also commissioned to write citations. Under usual circumstances, field biologists devote most of their efforts to other fish and wildlife management activities, with law enforcement a secondary function.

"The illegal hunter not only breaks the law," McKean points out, "but he also cheats the law-abiding citizen. Private individuals can help slow down illegal hunting by promptly reporting violations they see or hear about to the State Police or Game Commission officer."

McKean offers the following advice to the public on reporting illegal hunting. Citizens should not try to apprehend lawbreakers themselves but it will help police officers if they can get car license or boat registration numbers; make, model, year, and color of vehicles; and descriptions of the individuals involved. The sooner this information is reported, the better the chance criminals can be apprehended and prosecuted.
