Pendleton Round-up Starts September 12

When the 62nd annual Pendleton Round-Up gets underway Wednesday, September 12, it will be the last of the "big four" rodeos in the Pacific Northwest to entice some of the top cowboys in the nation to compete in the Rodeo Cowboys Association events. The other rodeos which make up the group now known as the Big Four are Walla Walla, August 31, September 1 & 2; Ellensburg, September 1, 2 & 3; and Lewiston, September 7, 8 and 9.

Receive Ribbons at Mule-Burro Show

Mrs. Leroy Churchill and daughter Nancy of Vale attended the 2nd Annual Mule and Burro Show at Walla Walla, on August 19. They showed three head, two jenny burros and a mini mule. They returned home with a First Place ribbon and a Trophy and Championship ribbons for 3-year and older jenny burros, and a 4th place ribbon on the mini mule. There was a hundred head of stock entered. Plans have been made for the 1974 show, which will be held next August in Redmond, Oregon.

County 4-H Member Will Assist State Fair

This is the first year that older 4-H members have been given the opportunity to assist with the State Fair, Mobley explains. Room and board is being provided.

It is expected that the 4-H members from throughout the state will serve as clerks, scorers, supervisors of exhibits and contests and as 4-H hosts and hostesses in the exhibit building.

The 4-H members, who will be under the general supervision of Marcia Thompson, Oregon State University home economics student from Reedsport, will work with college students and members of the professional OSU extension staff who are in charge of 4-H State Fair activities.

Tussock Moth Forcing Confrontation Over DDT

A small innocent-looking insect, the tussock moth, is rapidly gaining the reputation of a "bad guy" in Oregon, and is also forcing a confrontation between state officials and the federal government's Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

RECENTLY, the EPA decided to prohibit the use of the insecticide DDT because of ecological side-effects linked to the chemical. Then, however, the tussock moth arrived on the scene in Northeastern Oregon and starts attacking acres of Douglas Fir trees. State officials requested a special application of DDT to combat the insect, but the EPA took the position that other alternatives should be used.

Other alternatives have been tried over the last few months, but the tussock moth has survived them and continues to destroy valuable timber.

Last week three members of Oregon's congressional delegation came out in support of an end to the EPA's ban on the use of DDT in the area.

All four rodeos contribute a total of \$500 each year into a purse and it is given to the one cowboy who scores highest at all four shows. The purpose is to add an extra incentive to draw the big names to these four events. In addition, each show adds an extra \$100 into a cumulative fund, and it is given to any cowboy who is successful in winning three Big Four awards. This fund will rise to \$1600 after this year's show and is in no danger of being depleted since there is not even a cowboy at present who has won two, let alone three times. Several have won one award and could get their second leg this year. The fund was depleted a few years ago when five time all-around champion Larry Mahan, then of Brooks, Oregon, won a third leg and walked off with \$5600 that had been building for many years.

The Big Four award was first established in 1956, and since then has been won on an annual basis by such big names as Mahan, Kenny Stanton, 1966; Dean Oliver, 1962; Harley May, 1961; Marty Wood, 1958; and Jim Shoulders, 1957.

The program was instituted to provide older 4-H members with experience in organizing, leadership and supervision, explains Cal Monroe, OSU assistant state 4-H leader, and to give them an opportunity to work with many different people.

D'Aun Dick, Malheur County 4-H member will get an "inside" look at the 1973 Oregon State Fair when she spends three days in Salem assisting with 4-H State Fair operations, says Ron Mobley, Malheur County Extension Agent.

Miss Dick is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doyal Dick of the Annex Community. D'Aun was a 1973 graduate of Weiser High School.

DURING A PRESS CONFERENCE at the Malheur County Fair last Friday, August 17, Sen. Robert "Bob" Packwood said he had visited the area and felt it was vital that the use of DDT be allowed.

Also last week, Sen. Mark Hatfield said that he has asked Russell Train, nominated to head EPA, to "visit this devastated area of our state for a first-hand look at this tragic situation."

CONGRESSMAN AL ULLMAN, in a letter to Train last week, said it is imperative for the agency to send in a special team to follow the situation and coordinate protection efforts with state and federal foresters.

ACCORDING TO ULLMAN, EPA's original decision refusing to allow controlled use of DDT has forced an ecological disaster on thousands of acres of Douglas Fir forest.

He said EPA should make DDT available on a stand-by basis for use under controlled conditions for emergencies such as the tussock moth crisis.

Interior, Agriculture Announce Final Wild Horse Regulations

Owners of unbranded free-roaming horses or burros grazing on the public lands in Oregon will have until November 15, 1973, to file their claims of ownership with the appropriate federal agency. The November date is the end of the 90-day claiming period which began today, August 15, with the publication of the final "wild horse" regulations in the Federal Register.

The new regulations, a result of the 1971 "Wild Horse" Act, give the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service authority for management and protection of unclaimed, unbranded, free-roaming horses and burros on lands under their administration.

According to the federal officials, persons claiming ownership of horses or burros on public lands which are not authorized by a current license or permit must file their claim with BLM or the Forest Service within 90 days from date

of publication of this regulation. Forms necessary for the filing of claims are available from all field offices of the two agencies.

Persons who are not sure of the land ownership in a particular area should check with local agency offices.

All claims for animals will be examined for validity by BLM or the Forest Service and possibly the Oregon Department of Agriculture before Permission to gather will be granted. BLM, Forest Service, and the Oregon Department of Agriculture are discussing a cooperative agreement which establishes criteria for determining ownership compatible with state and federal law.

Actual gathering of claimed animals will begin after the 90-day period and will be done under the direct supervision of the agencies. No animals may be gathered from public lands without written permission.

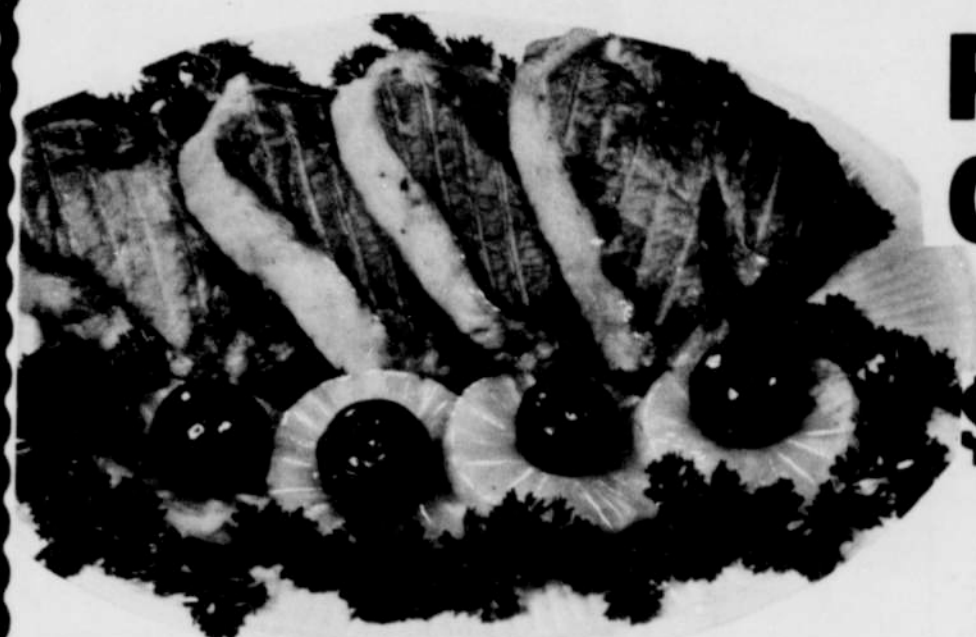


Pendleton Rodeo Queen
