TRAFFIC VOLUME SHOWS INCREASE

Traffic volume on most of Oregon's highways showed an increase in vehicular traffic in May, 1973 compared to May of 1972, according to the monthly report compiled by the Oregon State Highway Division. A summary of traffic recorder data for rural and urban state highways showed an increase of 6.8 per cent in vehicular traffic in May, 1973 compared to May, 1972. The first five months of 1973 showed an increase of 9.6 per cent in vehicular traffic compared to the first five months of 1972.

Receives Degree

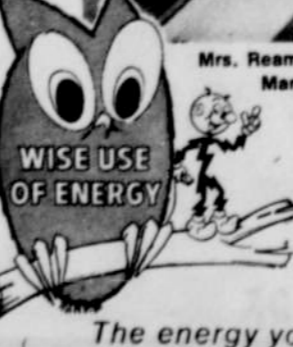
