MALHEUR POMONA GRANGE

The regular quarterly meeting of Pomona Grange #33 was held Saturday evening, August 25, 8 p.m., at the Vale Grange Hall with Master Ross Harvey presiding.

State Grange Deputy Robert Coble and Mrs. Coble were escorted to the Master's Station by Assistant Stewards protom Mr. and Mrs. John DeBoer. Mrs. Georgia Clark was given the Fifth Degree obligation by Deputy Coble and was welcomed by the members. Coble spoke briefly on the aims of the Grange.

Roll call of granges found members reporting as follows: Orville Nichols, Master, Vale; Orma Cleaver, Chaplain, Oregon Trail; Ross Harvey, Master, Oregon Slope; Clea deBoer, Treasurer, Boulevard; William Andregg, Steward, Big Bend; and Leo Tschida, Executive Committee, Ontario Heights.

County Deputy Dale Teter reported that there were approximately 438 Grange members in the County.

One resolution voicing opposition to the moving of agriculture exhibits from the regular building into a tent at the State Fair at Salem this year was offered by Washington County Pomona Grange and was approved by Malheur Pomona.

A report on the tri-county picnic held at Whitmore Park was given by Picnic Chairman Mrs. Orville Nichols. She reminded members to keep the date, the last Sunday in July, in mind for next year's funtime.

Master Ross Harvey reported that the Pomona Booth at the Fair had won a red ribbon and he thanked all those who helped in the construction.

CWA Chairman Clea deBoer reminded members to have their needle work entries ready for judging before September 5.

Grange was closed in regular form and the guest speaker Bruce Sarazin, co-ordinator of the Solid Waste Planning Project, was introduced by Lecturer Ellen Jones.

Sarazin stated that the plan is still in the preliminary stages of development and comments and suggestions from the group would be welcome.

Colored slides of the garbage dumps and maps of the many locations, 104 of them illegal, gave the Grangers a very good picture of the seriousness of the situation.

It was stated that Malheur County has received grants for Solid Waste Management Planning. The plans suggest that landfills would be centrally located between Ontario, Vale, and Nyssa. A transfer system would serve Adrian, Napton, Oregon Slope, Annex, Willow Creek, Brogan, Jamieson, Harper, and Juntura. Modified landfills would be located at Ironside, Harper, Jordan Valley, and McDermott.

Sarazin stated that revenue for this project will NOT be obtained through taxes. It is proposed that each house in the rural areas within the transfer system or located near a landfill or modified landfill will be charged a \$10 per year fee for both transfer and disposal costs. Each residential housing unit in cities will be charge a users fee of about \$5.40 for disposal only, the cities to collect the fee.

Sarazin answered many questions from Grange members. Refreshments were served by the host Grange. The next regular Pomona meeting will be held Saturday noon, November 17, at Oregon Slope Grange Hall.

INSIGHTS INTO PSYCHOLOGY

SPEAKING TO THE CONSUMER

FRESHNESS OF PERISHABLES. Oregon consumers have made a great step toward a longtime goal: open dating of perishable products. Their efforts resulted in legislation that will require dating of all perishable food products on Oregon's retail shelves as of January 1, 1974. The Oregon State Department of Agriculture will develop the kind of dating consumers feel would be the most meaningful for each kind of perishable product.

If you are interested and have comments to make on how the dates should be used—packing date, pull date, or, in the case of fresh poultry, the slaughter date—watch the newspapers for notices of hearings on open dating. You must attend the hearings to make your comments.

TRAVEL COSTS UP. Vacationing by car this fall? You may need to allow more per day than last year if you stay in motels and eat your meals out. The American Automobile Association suggests that you allow about \$52 a day in your budget for a couple—and more, if children are involved. Costs include \$19 a day for lodging, \$18 for meals, \$10 for car expenses if you drive 300 miles a day and \$5 for tips and miscellaneous costs.

CONTRACTS AND THE LAW. When you sign an installment contract you are entering into an agreement with a business firm that is enforceable in court, so it is important to understand all of the terms in the contract before you sign it. If you don't understand the contract, ask questions. If the amount of money is large, it may be advisable to consult an attorney.

For additional information on contracts and what they are, ask your county extension office for a copy of Extension bulletin 832, "The Family and the Law."

VITAMIN OVERDOSES. Concern about the safety of certain vitamin products has led the Food and Drug Administration to issue an order restricting the sale of high potency Vitamin A and Vitamin D preparations to prescription status. Limits established are 10,000 International Units of Vitamin A and 400 International Units of Vitamin D per dose. Excessive intake of these nutrients has been shown to have adverse effects.

THE restriction goes into effect in October.

IT'S A GAMBLE. A service contract on a large appliance resembles insurance. You pay an annual fee to the dealer and in return, you get an agreement for unlimited repairs on your appliance. A service contract can be an asset if your appliance frequently needs expensive repair work. But if you don't ever need to use the service contract, it can be a liability.
