Benefit Plan

On 21 September 1972, the President signed into law a bill providing a Survivor Benefit Plan for Uniformed Services retirees. This law replaces the present Retired Serviceman's Family Protection Plan (RSFPP) for future retirees. Although designed for future retirees, the provisions of the new plan are also applicable to members retired before the date of enactment regardless of whether they are participants under RSFPP. Members who are retired before the date of enactment may provide survivor protection for their spouse, children, or, in some cases, a close relative. The member can obtain this coverage by electing to participate in the plan prior to 21 September 1973. THIS MEANS YOUR ELECTION FORM MUST BE RECEIVED BY THE NAVY FINANCE CENTER, CLEVELAND, OHIO 44199, ON OR BEFORE 20 SEPTEMBER, 1973. Governor Issues Declaration Of An Energy Emergency

9. To the extent possible, increase the frequency of tune-ups of State-owned automobiles. Insure maximum tire pressures are maintained. 10. Post notices that as a condition of use of State-owned cars, drivers must limit their speed to 55 miles per hour. 11. Prohibit one-person use of State cars, within reasonable limits. One-person use continues to be authorized in cases where the auto is assigned to an individual for a specific purpose, but all such arrangements are to be recertified by agency Administrators and Directors to the Director of the Department of General Services. 12. Consider adding additional shuttle service in the Salem-Portland service now offered. Continuously respect the need of the Portland metropolitan area for fewer autos in the downtown area. 13. Advise all State agencies that, in view of the energy emergency, a curtailment in energy use of at least 10 per cent can and should be accomplished through simple means, such as a reduction in lighting, turning off motors not in use, less use of duplicating machines, and curtailment of travel. 14. Issue a request through

all available means asking State employees and the public at large for other recommendations on energy conservation in State government. 15. Survey all State employees and any other purchasers of space in State-owned parking lots to determine their number of trips, passenger carried, and their use and knowledge of the availability of mass transit. 16. Turn off all hot water heaters in state facilities except where the hot water provided is essential for health, job performance or food preparation. This declaration will remain in effect until further notice. I recognize that some of these actions will require substantial planning and negotiation with public or private interests. I will accede to special considerations, but only as determined by the Director of the Department of General Services, and, through the appeal process, by me. Additional directives will be necessary later concerning conservation measures especially applicable to fall and winter. These will be issued at an appropriate time and made a part of this Order.
