Following their wedding trip to Southern California, Mexico and Arizona the couple are now at home at 4045 N. Interstate, Portland.

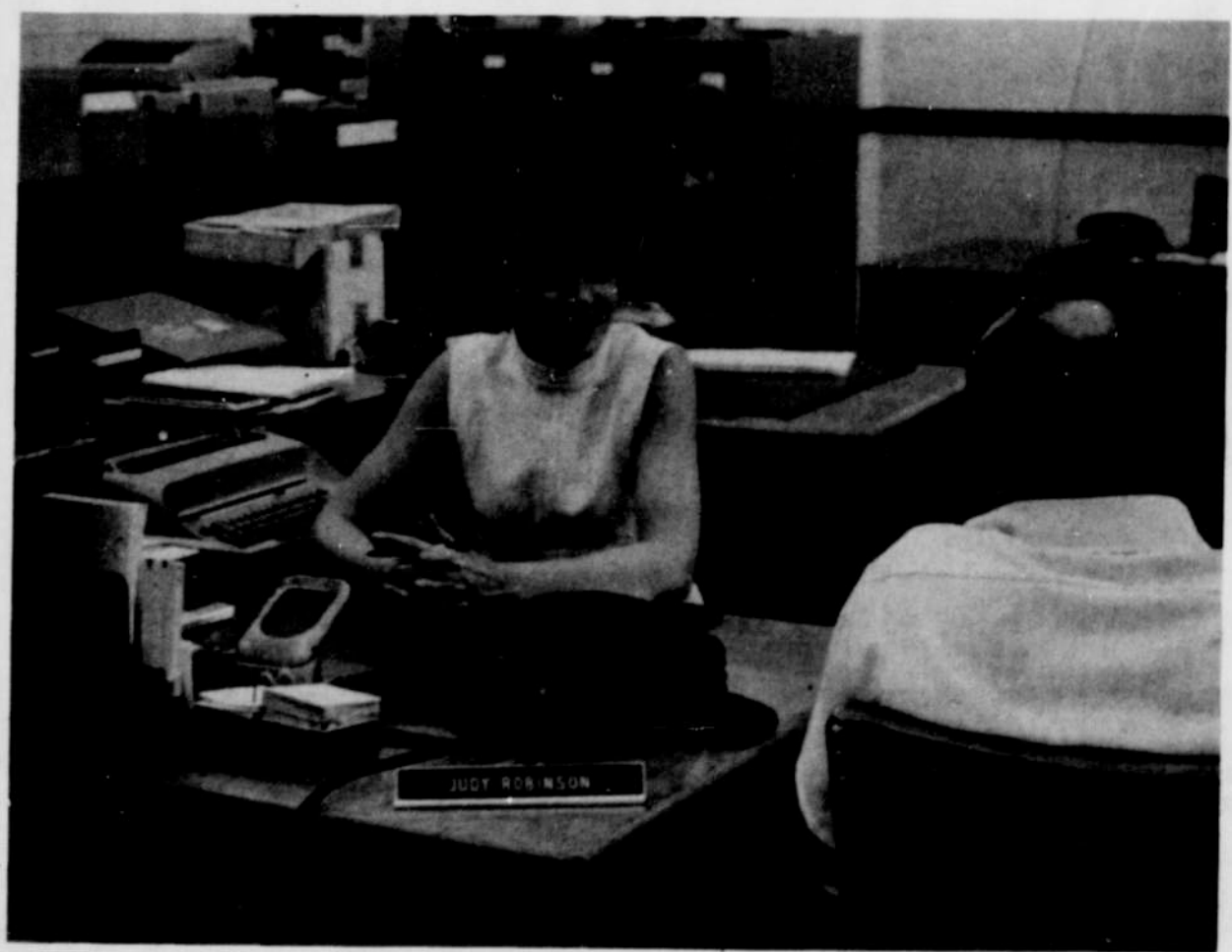
