Oregon High School Press Conference In October

Some 500 student journalists and 60 high school journalism advisors will be on the University of Oregon campus October 12-13 to attend the 47th annual Oregon High School Press Conference.

Fifty workshop sessions for students will cover all phases of production for high school newspapers and yearbooks. All events will be in the Erb Memorial Union at the University.

Cordon Jones, turf editor and racing handicapper for the Los Angeles Herald-Examiner, will be the speaker for the Friday night banquet.

Jones, who received his master's degree in journalism from the U of O, has taught journalism at Oregon, Arizona State, and the University of Southern California.

He has held writing and editorial assignments with the Denver Post, Beverly Hills Times, San Francisco News, and has been on the staffs of a number of California and Arizona television stations.

Speaker at the all-conference session at 11 a.m. Friday will be Lucille Vaughan Payne of Brownsville, Oregon. She is a former reporter and editor, high school and U of O writing teacher, and free-lance

writer. She is now writing a series of high school English texts.

Lee Faust, director of the new Communications Media Occupation Cluster Program, sponsored by the U. S. Office of Education and located at Oregon State University, will

explain the program at a Friday breakfast of journalism teachers.

The conference is sponsored by the U of O School of Journalism with Alyce Sheetz, executive secretary of Oregon Scholastic Press, as chairman. Assisting will be officers of the

Oregon Journalism Education Association. Officers include: Eleanore Hermanson, Grant High School, president; William Mohn, Grant High School, president-elect; Eugene Kirk, Willamette High School, secretary; and James MacPherson, Corvallis High School, treasurer.

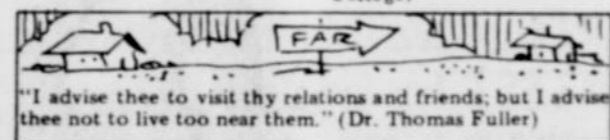
News About SERVICEMEN
