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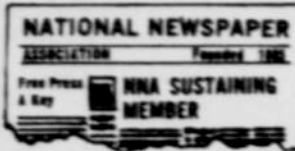

### Bicycle Safety Program

The Bicycle Safety program now underway, sponsored by the Nyssa Police and the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce, is timely and much needed. The Rev. Bob Hutchinson and Chief Alvin Allen can be credited with spearheading the effort, and doing much of the legwork in lining up sponsors for the prizes.

The coming of the ten-speed bike seems to have changed the whole concept of bike riding, and instead of a pretty useful vehicle to transport kids (and adults) around town, the new bikes are a speedy and complicated vehicle which can be very dangerous if not used properly.

Most of us have observed an increasing amount of traffic violations by bike riders, and some riders pay no attention at all to stop signs and basic rules of the road. All too frequently, lately, police have had to investigate scrapes between bikes and cars. We have been fortunate that there are no casualties, but in most confrontations between bikes and cars the bike rider is bound to come out second best.

Another aspect of the ten-speed bike is that they have become an attractive commodity for thieves. About ten of the bicycles have been reported stolen in the last few weeks in Nyssa. The police-sponsored bicycle clinic will help in this regard, as they register and mark the owner's name on the bicycle. This will make it harder for the thief to disguise the bike, and easier to identify the bike if it is stolen. Parents are encouraged to see that their children participate in these clinics, where they can learn safe riding habits, but also proper care of their bikes.

Youngsters have been seen riding against traffic, riding on sidewalks, parking in the middle of sidewalks, and violating every kind of city and state ordinance. It has become more than just a concern, but a matter of life and death.

Bicycles are a wonderful and useful vehicle, and it's good that they are regaining their popularity. It's also good that our community is concerned enough that steps are being taken to assure that the bikes are cared for and ridden in a proper manner. This should also be a number one concern of all parents whose children are bike riders.

### FORMER MINISTER RETURNS SEPT. 30



REV. FLOYD WHITE

An old-timer of Nyssa returned for a short visit last week, and made preparations for a return visit on September 30. He is Rev. Floyd White, who served the Methodist Church here from 1932 to 1939. He is now retired and lives at Kennewick, Washington, but keeps busy writing, traveling and preaching. He will preach at the 11 a.m. service Sunday, September 30, at the United Methodist Church and invites his many old friends to come and visit with him and his wife Ione on that day.

Rev. White started his ministry at New Meadows, Idaho and then served Nyssa and Apple Valley for the seven years which he calls the most exciting and rewarding of all his years as a minister. It was during this time soon after the Owyhee Dam was completed that the new land was taken out of sagebrush into productive farm land, and he knew and respected most of those who he says worked so hard during rough days for many of them.

After leaving Nyssa he served at Union, LaGrande, Vale in 1957, Joseph and Paul, Idaho where he retired.

Rev. White has recently completed writing a book, "Nuggets of Gold," relating many humorous incidents in his life and the lives of others. Caxton Printers of Caldwell printed the books, and some will be available for those who are interested when he is in Nyssa Sept. 30.
