The event promises to assist the home seamstress in creating more attractive comfortable fashions, states Mrs. Knothe.

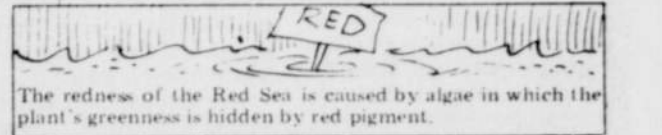

MALHEUR MEMORIAL HOSPITAL A Report To The People

We sincerely hope that our readers are pursuing and profiting from the Malheur Memorial Hospital column, which is appearing each week in this paper. A real insight into work at the hospital is revealed. This week the column covers the work of the nurses. We often wonder why so many girls decide to enter this demanding profession, but thank goodness they do.

The nurse's first responsibility is to the patients under her care. The patient's welfare and comfort should always be given first consideration. Along with this is the reassurance of relatives and friends.

The nursing day at our hospital begins at 7:30 each morning. The nurses, LPN's and aides scheduled for a given day arrive at the nurses' station for morning report from the nurse in charge of the previous eight-hour shift. She reports the condition of each patient, and whatever progress the patient has made during the night. The LPN's or Aides then begin the day by taking the temperature of each patient and administer care in many small ways to prepare the sick for breakfast, which is served at 8:00 a.m. Some need be fed by the aide.

The registered nurse or nurses depending on how many patients there are then proceed with their duties. One checks the medications each patient may be getting and prepares to give these to each one as orders of the doctor may indicate. The other nurse or sometimes a Licensed Practical Nurse proceeds with assignments of each LPN or aide to her duties for the day. Each LPN or aide has up to six patients to bathe and be responsible for during her eight-hour shift. Some of these patients may be returned from surgery asleep, and will need to be carefully watched until awake. It is the nurse's duty to instruct and be sure that all treatments and types of care are carried out as the doctor has ordered.

When the individual doctors arrive, the nurse is to be on hand to answer questions regarding his patients, and make rounds with him if he so chooses, to see each of his patients, to take any new orders, and to help him with treatments, dressings, etc. All these things are accomplished along with reassuring relatives and friends of the patient, admitting new

patients, and discharging those well enough to go home.

Throughout the day, there are also patients taken care of in the emergency room. Some are seriously hurt, some not so critical, but all requiring calls to their doctor or the doctor on call.

At noon lunch trays are passed by the LPN's, aides and Dietary employees, and patients needing to be fed are again cared for, after which, nurses, LPN's and aides try to take a half-hour break.

After lunch medications are again administered, and the patient rests for a time before visiting hours begin at 2:00 p.m.

At all times the nurses are supervising care to the patients and recording all pertinent items used in the patient's care are also recorded for the use of the business office staff in making charges. These notes then become a part of the patient's complete medical record, which is stored in the medical record library for any future use. This recording is becoming more time consuming all the time as government demands increase such as in Medicare where you get paid accordingly to how well the record is documented.

Suddenly at 3:30 p.m., we find that eight hours have passed. Report is again given to the 3:30-11:30 shift who follow the same procedures of continued care to the patients. Again, this takes place at 11:30 to the next shift. This goes on and on on 365 days per year. That is how nursing service works at the Malheur Memorial Hospital.

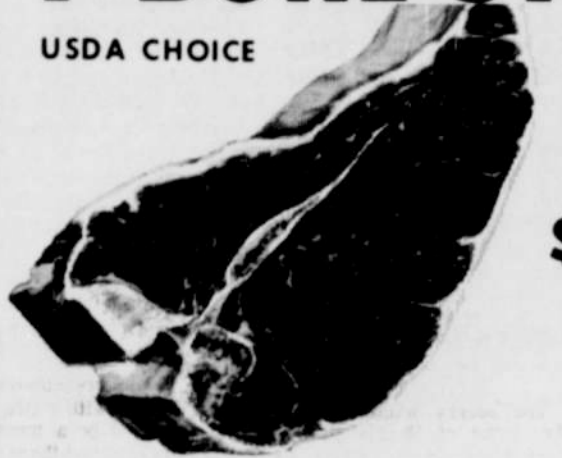
