BLM Advisory Terms Expire

Terms of three members to the advisory board will expire October 31, according to George R. Gurr, manager of the V. A. District, Bureau of Land Management. Nominations for these positions which represent the Northern and Central Resource areas are now being accepted from livestock users in those areas.

Ranchers whose terms are expiring are Grady Romans, Northern Resource precinct, and Robert H. Skinner and Charles N. Maher, representatives from Central Resource precinct. All three men are eligible for nomination to three-year terms on the advisory board, along with other nominees from these two precincts only, Gurr said.

Nominations must be received in the Vale District office on or before August 28. Detailed information concerning nominations was sent to qualified range users last week.

A district-wide election will be held in October.

Drivers License Fees Go Up In October

The Motor Vehicles Division says it will cost more to drive a car in Oregon beginning Oct. 5. New fees approved by the 1973 Legislature to make the state's driver license program self-supporting take effect that date.

People who apply for a motorcycle endorsement on or after October 5 will pay a new fee. They will pay a one-time \$3.50 fee to have a regular driver's license endorsed to operate motorcycles.

Increases on other driver license fees will range from a low of 50 cents to a high of \$6. An instruction permit to learn to drive will increase from \$1 to \$3. An original driver's license fee will range from \$3 to \$6, depending on how near the applicant's birthdate is when the license is issued. It will cost \$4 to renew a driver's license. The \$1 increase is the first basic driver license fee increase since 1922.

The highest fee increase will be for reinstatement of a li-

cense that has been suspended. That fee will go from \$2 to \$8 with the added fee intended to cover costs of personal service of suspension notices when a certified mail notice is returned by the post office.

Other fees to be collected are:

original chauffeur license, \$2 to \$6, depending on the applicant's birthdate; combined original driver-chauffeur license, \$5 to \$12, again dependant on the applicant's birthdate; combined driver-chauffeur renewal, \$6.50; and duplicate license when lost, stolen or mutilated, \$2.00.

Cost for obtaining certified driving records will increase from \$1 to \$2.50.

The agency estimates that the fee changes will produce an additional \$2,248,000 in revenue during the 1973-75 biennium and will mean the agency will no longer have to "borrow" from motor vehicle registration fees to support driver license activities.

Adrian Schools Adopt Reduced Cost Lunch Fees

Adrian Public School District #61 today announced a free and reduced price meal policy for school children unable to pay the full price of meals served in schools under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size-income criteria for use in determining eligibility.

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown are eligible for meals free or at reduced price. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusual high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or

physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color, or national origin.

School principals will review applications and determine eligibility, and any parent dissatisfied with the ruling may contact Richard Bennett, School Board Chairman, for a hearing to appeal the decision.

BLM Asks For Seeding Bids

Rehabilitation of about 13,000 acres of rangeland burned by wildfire this summer will begin in early October, George R. Gurr, manager of the Vale BLM District, said this week.

The seeding project has been divided into three separate areas, the Blackjack Allotment and South Alkali Pastures of 4,500 acres each, and the Round Mountain Fire Rehab area of 3,900 acres. Seed to be planted in the first two areas will be Russian wildrye and crested wheatgrass. The Round Mountain seeding will include alfalfa and small burnet for wildlife as well as crested and beardless wheatgrass.

A tour for prospective bidders will leave from the district office in Vale at 8:00 a.m. September 18 for the projects sites which are located in the Adrian vicinity and near Rome. Interested bidders should bring their own vehicle and a lunch.
