### Agnew Is Right

Vice President Spiro T. Agnew has a right to be outraged by what he has accurately termed the "vicious and illegal practice" of individuals within the U.S. Department of Justice in Baltimore who are maliciously "leaking" secret information concerning alleged criminal activity to the public.

Every American has reason to be equally alarmed. If such malicious practice is allowed to continue, then no one in this Republic is safe. All can be accused by nameless and faceless informers, without the right of trial by jury, without the right to be heard, without the protection of law. There is no defense against that kind of government. You can be destroyed, your reputation, your business, your job, your security, your future; all can be wiped out. The crimes now being committed by the faceless informers within the office of the U.S. Attorney George Beall far exceeds the enormity of any crime committed by the Watergate telephone tappers.

Has the United States Attorney joined in a conspiracy with the enemies of the present administration in Washington to destroy both the President and the Vice President? What reward has been promised or given by enemies of the Administration? Are these unfair and unfounded implications? No less unfair than the accusations which are at this moment being leaked from the office of the U. S. Attorney. And if U. S. Atty. Beall thinks that such implications and accusations are unkind, he has a quick and easy way to remedy the situation; stop the leaks.

#### Reverend Bob's Column

This is another in a series of biographical sketches of the churches and ministers of Nyssa and Adrian.

This week's pastor is the Reverend Dale Hayford. His church is The Bible Missionary Church on the corner of N 2nd Street and Beech Avenue.



REV. DALE HAYFORD

Dale was born in the farming community of Fessenden, North Dakota. He later lived in Larimore where he attended Larimore Public Schools for twelve years. Following graduation he entered The Bible Missionary Institute in Rock Island, Illinois. The Bible Missionary Institute had a working agreement with the nearby Moline Community College whereby students could attend the Institute for one year and transfer to Moline for the rest of their studies. This was Dale's plan but Dale changed his plans when Dale received the divine call to the ministry. Of this Dale said, "It was during the first year at the Institute that God in His mercy forgave my every sin and also impressed upon my heart the call to preach the gospel. I am glad I obeyed for there is a real reward and privilege in walking with God and serving humanity." As God continued His work in Dale's life, four years later another wonderful experience of God's grace took place when "God in His goodness met my need of holiness of the heart when He cleansed my heart from inbred sin." (1 Peter 1:15-16 & Romans 6:6)

Continuing on concerning his wife Dale said, "The Lord has blessed me with a faithful companion who loves God and souls. Her name was changed from Lieta Garner to Lieta Hayford on August 2, 1963." Dale and Lieta have three children, Sandy nine-years, Cindy seven-years and Connie four-years old.

The Nyssa Bible Missionary Church was started in 1956 by the Reverend Lowell Foster who will be returning to Nyssa for a revival meeting in December. One year after beginning the church, they built the lovely church in which they now meet.

A few years after this the parsonage was built. The Preamble of The Bible Missionary Church Manual reads, "In order that we may preserve the divine heritage transmitted to us, the faith once delivered unto the saints, particularly the doctrine and experience of entire sanctification as a definite, instantaneous work of grace, and lift up the Bible standard of holiness in a world of crumbling principles and decaying morals, and that we may cooperate with other branches of the Church of Jesus Christ in the evangelization of the world by spreading scriptural holiness to the ends of the earth and glory God."

The Hayfords came to Nyssa in November of 1970. They enjoy living in Nyssa very much. They have found the people of Nyssa to be friendly and kind to them. It is their desire to be a blessing in the community. I have said before that Nyssa is blessed with many fine ministers, who are dedicated to preaching the Word of God and pastor churches built to the Glory of God. Dale and Lieta are good examples of this. I and the other ministers of Nyssa and Adrian are thankful for his ministry and the ministry of his church.

#### 10 YEARS AGO

The company is now completing a central office in Jordan Valley that will also provide dial service at Danner, Arock, Rome and surrounding territories.

#### 20 YEARS AGO

Full payment was tendered September 12 by Malheur Memorial Hospital Auxiliary to the Intermountain Surgical Supply Co. of Boise for an oxygen-air pressure lock installed at the hospital the first week in August by the auxiliary.

The piece of equipment, the most modern of its kind, has already proved its worth at the hospital, according to Peter Feissner, physiotherapist at the hospital.
