PRUNE CONSERVE

2 1/2 pounds plums-or prunes
3 oranges
1/2 pound seedless raisins
3 cups sugar
1/2 pound walnuts, chopped
Wash, pit and quarter plums. Wash and quarter oranges; remove seeds and grind. Mix plums, oranges, raisins and sugar together. Spread evenly on bottom of broiler pan in center of oven. Cook in 325 degrees oven 50 minutes. Add chopped nuts and continue cooking 10 minutes longer. Pour into hot sterilized jars immediately. Seal at once with melted paraffin. Yield: 6 half-pints.

The jar "lid" situation seems to be eased and they are now available-both regular and large self-sealing. Home-makers in Treasure Valley are really trying to cut the food budget.

Relishes are a trim for meats as well as bread and here's one for hamburger.

HAMBURGER RELISH

12 large cucumbers
4 large onions
4 green peppers
4 tsp. mustard seed
4 tsp. celery seed
2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. cloves
3 tsp. turmeric
5 cups sugar
1 quart vinegar
Grind cucumbers, onions, peppers. Boil 15 minutes in 2-quarts of water. Drain and add vinegar, sugar, and spices. Cook for 20 minutes on low heat. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.
