**Reverend Bob's Column**

It will return next week to an series of biographical sketches of the ministers of Nyssa-Adrian and the churches they pastor.

This week I would like to talk to you about our children and their bicycles. Many of you know of the bicycle safety program we are having in the Nyssa area and in the schools. We began this program because we were truly concerned about the safety of our bicycle-riders. Many bicyclists have been riding their bicycles in such a way that lives were being endangered.

Since we here in Nyssa want to see our youthful bicyclists grow to adulthood free of crippling injuries, since we want our children to not be suddenly taken from amongst us by a tragic bicycle-motor vehicle accident, we must do something about bicycle safety. Many bicyclists and their parents seem to have the idea, "It won't happen to my child and it may unless we stress safety and responsibility in bicycle riding."

I propose to you parents that you stress safe riding habits to your family. Make sure bicycle riding is often discussed subject in your home. Take an interest in your child's bicycle and it's necessary safety device.

By our school principals and teachers, I recommend that there be added in your information, a learning package on bicycle safety and that bulletin boards in your rooms and hallways feature from time to time the safe use of this most dangerous vehicle—the bicycle.

To our motorists, I suggest that you exercise care, patience, concern and understanding in the driving of our streets and highways. Expect our bicycle drivers to do the unexpected for they often do. Their judgment of speed, distance and time is not as well developed as age has allowed years to be.

I would like you to become a part of the team involved in the education of our children and allowing our children to grow up.

And then I would ask our city officials and city, county, and state police to begin now to enact and to enforce laws concerning the use and operation of the bicycle and to do so fairly, impartially and surely, but to do so with kindness and concern—

**EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 85-75-5**

**COMPLIANCE OF DISPLAY LIGHTING DURING ENERGY EMERGENCY**

Executive Order No. 85-75-5 declared an energy emergency in the State of Oregon. The people of Oregon were requested to respond affirmatively and voluntarily to this crisis. The current pattern of voluntary energy conservation has been encouraging, but the voluntary reduction in energy use is not by itself sufficient to avoid abrupt and widespread interruptions of electrical power which would seriously impair the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the State of Oregon. If further substantial savings of energy are not effected, Executive Order No. 85-75-5 as hereby incorporated in this Order by reference.

An emergency affecting the interests and general welfare of the state exists within and throughout the entire State of Oregon. The life and property of the citizens of Oregon as well as the general economic conditions are jeopardized and endangered by the existing and imminent energy shortage.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AND DIRECTED that no person shall cause or permit display lighting. Display lighting is the use of artificial light for decorative purposes, or to direct attention to the presence of goods or services, or to illuminate or direct attention to:

- a) Signs advertising goods or services or the providers of goods or services;
- b) Displays of goods;
- c) Objects or designs symbolic of commercial enterprises such as trademarks or
- d) buildings or landscaping.

However, where light is ordinarily used for purposes in addition to display lighting, display lighting includes only that use of light not reasonably necessary to accomplish the other purposes. Display lighting does not include the use of light necessary to identify the location of essential governmental services (e.g., fire and police), or health and communications services.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED AND DIRECTED that this Executive Order is effective from the date of its signing until rescinded by further Executive Order.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto subscribed my name and caused to be affixed the great seal of the State of Oregon. Done at Clatskanie Beach, Oregon, this 23rd day of September, 1973.

The Amalgamated Sugar Company factory was started Wednesday morning with sufficient personnel on hand to operate the plant, but more men could be used. R.G. Larson, district manager, announced.

Although there is considerable competition in the fields for labor, Mr. Larson feels that the best harvest is progressing as well as could be expected, although more labor is needed. An acreage of 25,000 acres is to be harvested.
