FAMILY PLANNING CLINIC AVAILABLE

The Malheur County Health Department offers Family Planning Clinics which began on a modified scale August 7. These clinics are in accordance with Senate Bill #172 that was passed by the 1973 Oregon Legislature.

Those receiving Family Planning services are given an initial physical examination by a physician, cancer screening and required laboratory tests. Pregnancy testing is also available. Each participant is required to take the Methods Class at the first visit. This class is taught by Karen Nelson who is the Public Health Nurse in charge of the clinic. This class explains the various methods of birth control that are available.

Community Jazz Band Being Organized At TVCC

A jazz ensemble and concert band will be available for residents of the entire Treasure Valley area to participate in on Thursday evenings at Treasure Valley Community College. Rehearsals will be held from 7-9 p.m., in the music room of the Tech-Lab Building.

The attempt to offer an opportunity for community participation in the band program was begun last year and resulted in a really swinging, "cooling," jazz ensemble. The success of last year's initial effort was largely due to the several area school band directors, high

school students, and community musicians who took part.

The plans for this year are to play not only jazz and music with the "big band" sound, but also concert band repertoire.

Jazz ensemble music will be played during the first hour of the rehearsal. This will range from standards of the "big band era" through compositions being written for today's new big bands, such as those played recently by the Buddy Rich Band in their Ontario performance.

During the second hour of the rehearsal, if there is sufficient interest, concert band litera-

ture, both traditional and contemporary, will be played.

It is hoped that this group will help serve the needs of community residents who would like to play in a group, of better high school students who would like to play in a sort of "honorary" group with older, more experienced musicians, and of band directors who don't get a chance to play their own instrument very much while teaching.

Jim Johnson, music director at Adrian High School, will be in charge of the program this year. Jim has been very active in the Oregon Music Educators' Association and is currently President of OMEA District IX. His bands have consistently received superior ratings at festivals. They have marched in Washington D. C. and are planning a trip to Disneyland for this year.

Assisting Mr. Johnson with the program will be other area band directors who will be participating. Rehearsals begin on Thursday, September 27.

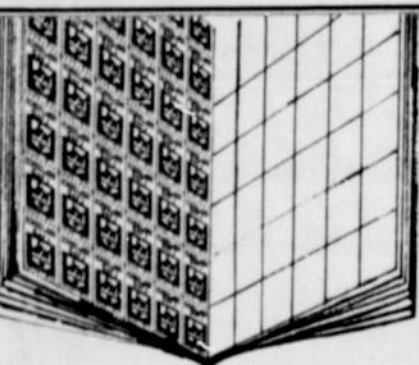

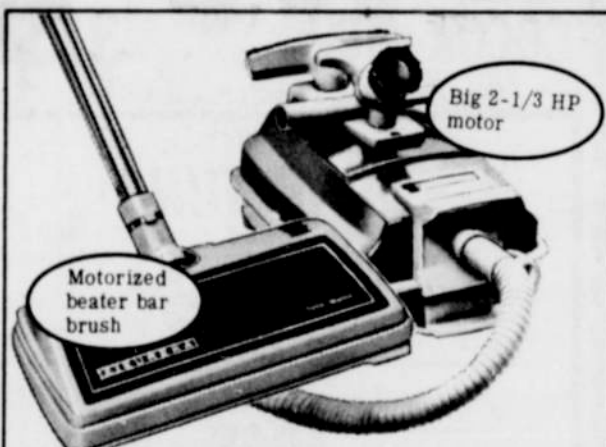
