Nominations Open For ASC Elections

Malheur County farmers are encouraged to nominate candidates for Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) community committeemen, reports Blaine Girvin, Chairman, Malheur County ASCS. Petitions, to be signed by a minimum of three qualified voters, must be filed by October 29, 1973, at the Malheur County ASCS Office, 1252 S.W. 4th Ave. - P.O. Box 338, Ontario.

"We are hopeful a slate of at least six candidates will be nominated by farmer petitions, including representatives of the minority groups in Malheur County," said Girvin. ASCS programs are non-discriminatory and administered without regard to race, color, creed, sex or national origin. Eligible farmers may sign many nominating petitions as they wish. No special petition form is required, but the petition must include a statement that the nominee is willing to serve if elected.

Most persons eligible to participate in ASCS programs are eligible to serve as ASC committeemen. This includes producers, share-croppers and tenants. Nominees must have farming interests within the ASC community, be qualified ASC voters and not have re-

Fire Restrictions Lifted on BLM Lands

The Bureau of Land Management today lifted fire restrictions on 13 million acres of national resource land east of the Oregon Cascades. The restrictions were ordered August 24.

While lifting the restrictions Archie D. Craft, BLM Oregon state director cautioned hunters and others using the public land to be careful with camp fires and smoking materials. "Each year during hunting season we get a number of man-caused fires," said Craft. "These fires are always the result of some careless act such as an untended warming fire or a cigarette tossed from a car."

Craft added that both federal and state laws make persons responsible for a wildfire liable for the costs of putting it out.

Kenneth Burkholder, BLM Protection Chief, said, "The fire danger is high in several areas, particularly Steens Mountain and the central Oregon area around Prineville." He added that continued dry weather will increase the danger. BLM personnel will patrol areas used by hunters beginning with the opening of deer season, October 6.

Both Craft and Burkholder urge sportsmen using the national resource lands to be careful with fire and leave a clean camp. Persons going outdoors may contact any BLM office and obtain information about litterbags and purchase maps of BLM lands.
