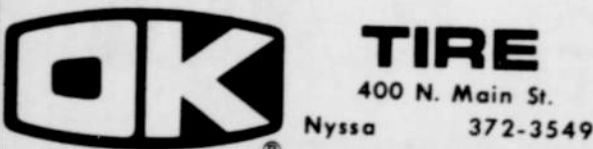

Referendum Fell Short Collective Bargaining

Senators Atiyeh, Meeker and Smith said Monday that as of October 8, they have not collected enough signatures to refer the public employees collective bargaining act to the voters.

"We are sorry that those who opposed our efforts took it upon themselves to be so concerned about people voting on the measure, that they did everything legally possible to thwart our efforts."

"We are personally sorry that they were afraid to have the people vote on the issue. It was our intention to give the people of Oregon a right to either approve or disapprove what we feel is a dramatic change in state policy. We hope the law works well, although we have grave concern about it," the three senators said.

"The referendum drive was a non-professional effort of interested citizens. We worked on a shoe string, but effectively designed our organization."

"We were instructed by the Secretary of State's Office not to file our petitions due to the fact that we fell short of our goal. We feel there is no point in taking up the state's time and money in checking the signatures on the petitions," they said.

It costs about \$50,000 per bed to build a hospital in Oregon. But that's just the beginning. Many people and a vast amount of expensive equipment must be available day and night in case someone needs the bed. So maintaining or caring for a bed, whether it's empty or occupied, costs \$29,000 a year.

facilities and equipment. They look to see if hospitals, mental health care services, public health clinics, and treatment centers are adequate. They plan for health care just as people in the community plan for schools—highways—urban development.

These organizations are set up throughout the state. There is one State Comprehensive Health Planning Authority. And there are 14 local Comprehensive Health Planning Associations which are dependent upon local financing in order to obtain matching federal funds.

Although the Comprehensive Health Planning Associations are staffed by professionals, consumers now have a voice in health planning in Oregon. In fact, 51 percent of the members of the boards must be non-professionals. These people, along with professionals, meet to review health care needs in Oregon.
