Basketball Rules Clinic

Baker High School will be the site of an Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA) sponsored basketball rules clinic Tuesday night, October 23, according to Dean Knight, commissioner of the Northeast Oregon Basketball Officials Association.

Knight has announced that John Hilsenteger, OSAA assistant executive secretary, will present the 7:30 p.m. clinic which is open to all officials, coaches and people interested in the game of basketball.

Feature of this year's clinic one of 14 being presented in different areas of the state, will be a new half-hour film entitled "Basketball Today." Produced by Official Sports Films, Inc., "Basketball Today" does a thorough job of covering several aspects of the game such as guarding and screening.

In addition to the film, Hilsenteger will discuss the rules changes for the 1973-74 season made by the National Basketball Committee of the United States and Canada. These changes are very few, and the average fan will notice little difference in the game from last season when a major change was made in the elimination of free throws on common fouls before the bonus rule takes effect.

The three points of emphasis for this coming season—fouling away from the ball, illegal use of hands, and illegal screening—also will be discussed at the meeting.

Malheur River Treated

The Oregon Game Commission successfully completed chemical treatment of the Malheur River, Bully Creek and Beulah Reservoirs two weeks ago.

About 95 percent of the fish killed were suckers, squawfish, chiselmouth, shiners and stunted yellow perch. Some game fish were killed below Warm Springs and Beulah Reservoirs. Many of these fish were salvaged by the public.

The Game Commission plans to stock the Malheur River and Bully Creek Reservoir with large fingerling rainbow next week. Following a treatment project, it normally takes several months for the aquatic insect production to build back up. Also during the winter months the food production is less in all waters. Because of the reduced food availability and low water, the fingerling trout stocked this fall will be spread rather sparsely throughout the treated area. Adult bass and white crappie will also be stocked in Bully Creek Reservoir this fall. Additional fingerling rainbow will be released in Malheur River, Bully Creek and Beulah Reservoirs when the water flow and storage is increased next spring. The Malheur River will also receive legal rainbow trout next spring.

The Falcons were Pat Elordi from 15 and 2 yards out, Randy Martinet scored on a 12 yard pass from Dee Pickett, but the big man for the Falcons certainly was Dee Pickett, scoring 3 out of 4 extra points, a 27 yard field goal, a one yard run and the 12 yard pass for a touchdown to Randy Martinet. The Falcons moved the ball for 160 yards, 102 in the first quarter.

Nyssa's first score came in the third period when back Paul Valencia turned a broken play and fumble into an 18 yard touchdown. Adding two more points to that was Jeff Marquez on an end sweep. Putting in a little razzle-dazzle Nyssa's fine young quarterback Neal Oldemeyer threw a flat pass to Marquez, who in turn lateraled to Kevin Adams and he ran for a 75 yard touchdown.

Nyssa's effective second half was credited to Dean Sappe, middle guard, Ted Joyce, defensive tackle who picked off an interception and Jeff Marquez who turned Vallivue's sweeps inside.

Nyssa's offensive workhorse was Chris Lords who carried 27 times for 103 yards. For Vallivue Elordi covered 78 yards in the first half and didn't carry in the second half.

Dwight Calhoun one of Nyssa's stars only punted as he is recovering from a shoulder injury.

The loss puts Nyssa at a 2-4 for the season and 1 for 2 in the league.

Nyssa plays Emmett on the Bulldogs' field this Friday, October 19 for their Homecoming game.
