THE INSECTS AROUND US

The many millers that you have seen around the past few weeks are the adults of some of the army worm, cut worm, and cabbage loopers that were feeding on the crops in the up, laborers will be permitted area during the past summer. As you can see, agricultural chemicals were not 100% effective in killing them. One reason for this is that most insects have a fantastic ability to reproduce themselves. couple of examples of this are:

if none were killed, could pro-1,560,000,000,000,000, 000,000,000 individuals in one season and one pair of house flies starting in April can theoretically produce enough flies by August to cover the earth to a depth of 47 feet. Any time that agricultural crops are concentrated in an area, certain insects, such as those we are now seeing, will multiply faster than normal.

It is for this reason that some type of control is a MUST to feed the people of the U.S. and the world. This all costs money and some estimates have placed the value of lost crops and keeping insects just checked. not controlled, at between 6 and 10 billion dollars a year in the U.S.

This is favorable for the pollination and development of the seed crop. Hot, dry weather is ideal for the leafcutter and alkali bee activity. 
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
