BLM Reaches Agreement With Ontario Rancher

Settlement has been reached between the Bureau of Land Management and Martin J. Sayers, Ontario area rancher, for damages which resulted when a controlled burn on Sayer's privately owned land burned out of control onto federal lands August 27, George R. Gurr, manager of the Vale District, announced this week.

Gurr said Sayers has agreed to pay a portion of fire suppression costs and will either pay for the rehabilitation or complete the work personally.

In announcing the settlement, Gurr noted that future enforcement of regulations concerning damages to National Resource Lands would be more strict. Costs are high and rising, he noted, and damage is not only very expensive monetarily, but damage to lost resources such as watershed and forage for livestock and wildlife takes several years to re-establish, or is often irreplaceable.

He pointed out that with the increased values of land and the greatly expanding use, now and in the future, of public land by recreationists and other interests, these lands

must be cared for and protected for optimum use.

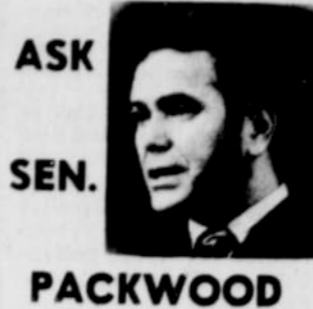
As a result of the Sayers fire, an in-depth look was taken at fire permits and their issuance by Malheur county and municipalities. A county fire marshal will be appointed and burning regulations will be far more stringent in the future.

Ironically, Sayers, a progressive rancher who has a deep interest and concern for wildlife and habitat, was burning the brush covered land preparatory to seeding to improve livestock and game forage, Gurr said, and had followed the BLM pattern for seeding as he felt it was the most successful method.

QUESTION: How much did Nixon's inauguration cost? I have heard estimates up to several million dollars.

ANSWER: The total bill for the inauguration probably will be about \$4 million, but about 65 per cent of this amount is paid for by private funds. Congress appropriated \$1.5 million for construction, and police and fire protection for the thousands of visitors who came to Washington for the event. But all the pageantry and regalia of the balls, concerts and receptions is paid for by persons who attend. You might be interested to know that a person who attended five of the major events offered would end up spending \$795 in tickets for a first class weekend. There were even tickets for the parade ranging from \$5 to \$50. Tickets for one concert ranged from \$30 to \$5,000. Another source of revenue comes from sale of souvenirs, generally ranging from \$3 to \$150. The advance cost of staging the elaborate unofficial events is provided by

Savings Bonds Increase

Sales figures released today by the U. S. Treasury Department indicate that Oregonians purchased \$3,722,880 worth of Savings Bonds in the month of August. Although somewhat lower than a year ago, in comparing August 1973 sales with last year's, the figures reveal that 1972 was one of the best August sales months achieved in many years.

Although Oregon's E-Bond sales of \$3,575,880 were slightly lower than last year's they are considerably higher than the previous year's. We attribute the increased sales of E-Bonds to the large number of companies that have increased their payroll participation among employees. Oregon has reached 71% of its 1973 goal; 13 of the counties have exceeded that percentage. Nationally, Savings Bonds sales were the best for August since 1952. E-Bond sales of \$545 million set a 28-year record for the month; H-Bond sales were \$22 million. August sales of E and H-Bonds totaled \$567 million--\$80 million more than July.

Exchanges of Series E-Bonds and Freedom Shares for H-Bonds totaled \$28 million for the month, \$1 million more than July. Sales exceeded redemptions, at cost price, for the 35th consecutive month.

E and H-Bond holdings rose to \$59.76 billion in August. With the inclusion of Freedom Shares withdrawn from sale July 1, 1970 total holdings of Bonds/Shares came to a record \$60.27 billion, an increase of \$3.3 billion since last August (23% of the privately-held portion of the public debt).
