of Travels**

The O. E. Chedelins returned last week from a twenty-three day guided tour to Yugoslavia, Greece and Bulgaria.

As their group of forty left the plane at the Belgrade airport, they were met by their tour guide, an intelligent and personable young Swiss, and were transported in their tour bus to their hotel in the city. The bus driver proved to be both amiable and capable as he drove over not only excellent highways but also over tortuous narrow mountain roads in the four thousand miles they travelled by bus. Much of the route lay along the beautiful Aegean Sea.

As expected conditions in Yugoslavia and Greece were quite good especially in the cities. Farm prices were high but the farms were so small they provided a very poor living. Bulgaria, toasty behind the Iron Curtain proved a surprise. The town people dressed well, drove small cars and lived in nice apartments, government owned, of course. The government provides total medical care and old age retirement. Since all able-bodied are forced to work, there are no unemployed, no relief and very little crime.

Perhaps the best known cities included in the tour are Sophia in Bulgaria, Thessaloniki, Delphi and Athens in Greece, Dubrovnik, split and the best known of the beach resorts, Opatiza, in Yugoslavia.

Of all the sights and places they visited undoubtedly the most memorable are the Acropolis of Athens, the scenic region of Sixteen Lakes at Plitvici, Yugoslavia, and the entertainment provided by the native folk singers and dancers at Sophia and Dubrovnik.

Although the trip was very pleasant and informative, they are glad to be back in Nyssa. After all, there's no place like home!
